



New Kingdom Trailriders

Kelly Kreiter Penning became executive director of the New Kingdom Trailriders in January 2022. He Linkedin page features a quote from Kelly, "Be fearless in the pursuit of what sets your soul on fire." It is evident from her extensive background that she has taken those words to heart for many years. She earned her Bachelor and Master of Business Administration Degrees from Northern Iowa Univ., studied International Studies for a year at the University of London, England, and later in life, obtained a master's degree in Mental Health Counseling from Northwestern University. She was employed for almost 17 years by John Deere working as Manager of Labor Relations, Manager of Leadership Development, and Manager of Talent Management. She then became Human Resource Director for Blysar, LLC a position she held for over three years. She then left to

continue her education at Northwestern University and was employed as a Graduate Assistant. Returning to the Quad Cities with her mental health degree she worked for Family Resources for 18 months as a mental health counselor and grief, loss & trauma therapist. She began her career with the Trailriders 8 months ago. Her journey with therapeutic riding programs started at Miracles in Motion in Swisher, Iowa, 24 years ago. She described her experience as "life changing" and credits that opportunity with igniting her passion for therapeutic riding. Prior to NKT, she volunteered at six PATH (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship) centers and served on the board at Rainbow Riders in Monmouth, Illinois. She has been actively volunteering with NKT for several years prior to becoming Executive Director. NKT is the Quad Cities only PATH accredited facility offering Therapeutic Horseback Riding lessons to riders as young as four years old. Their mission is to empower individuals of all ages and abilities to reach their full potential through equine assisted activities. Last year NKT provided 1,800 Lessons. Had 200 Volunteers who provided 5,000 hours of service. They work with all forms of disability, mental, social, physical, or behavioral. They also have client/patients of all ages ranging from 4 years to 78 years. All instructors are certified in Equine Therapeutics. Through their 6-session, 6-week programs they help empower their "riders", building confidence, mobility, and developing social skills. Kelly stated that their facilities are "absolutely beautiful" with indoor and outdoor riding arenas, a very well-kept barn, and 30 acres of pasture for their herd of 14 horses and ponies. They are careful to match riders and horses in abilities and temperament. The New Kingdom Trailriders have a staff of 4 paid employees and many volunteers. They are very welcoming and want to ensure that the facility and program are accepting and inclusive. The program currently serves 80 riders and can handle up to 100. Riders pay for approximately 25% of the cost of the program with scholarships available for those unable to pay. The bulk of funding for NKT, a not-for-profit organization, comes from donations, partnerships, and fundraisers. Thank you Kelly for a very enlightening program. Lots of great works if being done by the New Kingdom Trailriders

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 3 of RI's Month of Membership & Extension.

Emma Walker-Silverman, from Telluride, Colorado, who is pursuing a PhD at Oxford University, England, has been awarded a prestigious Rotary International Global Grant Scholarship for \$30,000 to support her research, which seeks to understand and reduce conflict between refugees and host countries. The scholarship will cover tuition to complete her PhD in International Development at the University of Oxford. While her program is based in the UK, her fieldwork focuses on Turkey, where she has spent a great deal of time ever since she was a Rotary Youth Exchange student to Istanbul during her sophomore year at Telluride High School.

Walker-Silverman has received numerous scholarships and awards throughout her academic career, including a Fulbright for research following her undergraduate study at Stanford University. But this Rotary scholarship, she said, "is by far the most generous funding I have received and will allow me to focus my full time and energy on completing my research. In addition, the scholarship brings with it further connection to the global Rotary community in the form of a hosting club in Oxford and a cohort of fellow scholars that I will join this autumn, adding a human dimension to the academic experience. I'm deeply grateful to the Telluride Rotary Club for their warm and unwavering support during this extended application process, and to District 5470 and Rotary International for putting their faith in my work."


FINES – HAPPY/SAD DOLLARS

CLUB MEMBERS CITED FOR DEDICATED SUPPORT OF THE ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

Becoming a Paul Harris Fellow is a goal of all Rotarians. That honor is bestowed upon a Rotarian or nominee of a Rotarian in recognition of \$1,000 in donations to our International Foundation. In recognition of the honor the recipient receives a gold Paul Harris Fellow pin. Many Rotarians continue their support of the Foundation and for each additional \$1,000 donated, the Rotarian doner receives recognition as Paul Harris +1, Paul Harris +2, etc. A blue stone is added to the member's Paul Harris pin for each additional \$1,000 up to \$5,000, then for six thousand and each thousand through \$9,000 a red stone is added. When \$10,000 is reached a diamond is added to the pin. Two diamonds for \$20,000 and on up. Today two of our members were recognized for their dedicated support and generosity.

Mark Mayeski received a gold Paul Harris Fellow pin with a red stone in recognition of earning the status of a Paul Harris Plus 6 donor. That indicates that since earning his own Paul Harris Fellow award, Mark has donated \$6,000 more to the Foundation. Pins with red stones are reserved exclusively for those who have donated \$5,000 or more. The Club thanks Mark and congratulates him on earning the Red Stone Paul Harris pin. Mark is also our new District 6420 Paul Harris Society chairman. He served as our club's president for the 2019-2020 Rotary Year and was our 2018 recipient of the A.T Peara Award..

Frank Lambert also received a gold Paul Harris Fellow pin with a red stone in recognition of his earning the status of a Paul Harris Plus 8 donor. That indicates that since earning his own Paull Harris Fellow award, Fran has donated \$8,000 more to the Foundation. When Frank reaches \$10,000 and we have no doubt he will, the red stone becomes a diamond! In accepting the award Frank urged Club members to follow his lead and set up an automatic monthly account withdrawal for the Rotary International foundation. He said even a small monthly donation adds up quickly when done automatically and regularly. Our Club thanks Frank and congratulates him on receiving his Red Stone Paul Harris pin. Frank served our club as president for the 1990-1991 and 2012-2013 Rotary Years. He received the A.T. Peara Award in 2002.
