Ty J. Grunder, is a Small Business Specialist at the U.S. Bank branch in Moline. He joined the Bank in January of 2021. He previously served as Director of Corporate and Community Relations for St. Ambrose University. He workded to establish the University as an essential resource to elected officials/staff, and agency officials. Prior to that he was Assistant Director of Development – Ophthalmology at The University of Iowa Center for Advancement. He also served as the Major Gifts Officer for Upper Iowa University in Fayette, Iowa. Mr. Grunder earned his Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Upper Iowa University and his Master of Business Administration (MBA), with emphasis in International Business also from Upper Iowa University. He has served as a volunteer counselor at the Northeast Iowa Camp ol Royal Family KIDS woking with and mentoring children with neglected & abused backgrounds from ages 6-12. He also served as co-leader for Jr. High and High School Youth Group Ministry for the Coram Deo Bible Church in Davenport. Ty also serves as President of the BNI Quad City Breakfast Club. He said it is critical for anyone starting or operating a business to surround themselves with trusted advisors. He suggested an accountant, lawyer, insurance agent, and a financial advisor. He stated that the core components of a business operating cycle are cash management, inventory management, accounts payable, distribution and sales of goods, accounts receivable, and capital investment. Business specialists help owners with questions and potential solutions in each area. When asked what advice he has for someone considering starting up a business is to "dive in head first" but also emphazized that they must have patience and not expect overnight success. Before making the dive a prospective entrepreneur needs to have a business plan, advisors in place, and funding available or lined up. He noted that the first 2 years of a business are "life and death". He also said new business owners need to be careful not to "bite off more than they can chew". When asked about business location Mr. Grunder said that in today's world everything is done by analytics. Businesses need to locate where there is adequate traffic to warrant a physical location. He also stated that although it is a generational thing, many people now conduct their busineses, including their banking entirely on their telephone or computer. He also said businesses are teaching customers how to do it. He said the goal of the business specialist is to hep customers save money and be more efficient.

Rotary notes that many banks have "business bankers" or "small business specialists" and therefore Mr. Grunder's comments were intended as information on the role of such positions and the services they provide. 
FEELING LUCKY?

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Rotary International and Ukraine Friends, a U.S.-based nonprofit, have agreed to collaborate to provide resources, organize logistics, and distribute funds for high-impact projects that help Ukrainians affected by the war with Russia. Rotary has awarded 272 disaster response grants totaling \$8.9 million since the Russian invasion of Ukraine. These grants, for club projects in 29 countries, support people in and around Ukraine who have been affected by the war. Rotary and Rotaract clubs worldwide have also donated millions more directly to Ukrainian clubs that are providing water, food, shelter, medicine, and clothing.

"Rotary is delighted to expand its reach by partnering with Ukraine Friends," RI General Secretary and CEO, John Hewko says. "This terrible crisis has brought out the best in Rotary — demonstrating our generosity, increasing membership in Ukraine, and now opening up new opportunities for providing vital services." The partnership with Ukraine Friends, Hewko believes, will help Rotary "do more for Ukrainians as they struggle to survive and rebuild in the months and years ahead."

Rotary and Ukraine Friends have agreed on their first joint project, which is procuring and delivering nearly 50 ambulances to hospitals and other organizations. Rotary and Ukraine Friends have donated \$300,000 each toward the ambulances, and Rotary districts in Ukraine and Slovakia will work with Ukraine Friends to coordinate the delivery.

The collaboration between Rotary and Ukraine Friends, according to Brock D. Bierman, CEO Ukraine Friends, "will have an amplifying effect and create an even larger impact on those we are trying to help,...the critical humanitarian assistance and medical aid to those most in need will provide Ukrainians with a helping hand exactly at the time when they need it most."
