The Moline Foundation, like most community foundations is a tax-exempt charitable organizations created by a community to benefit the people who live there. As public charities, community foundations can raise money from individuals, businesses, groups of people, or other foundations. Community foundations, like The Moline Foundation, make it easy for generous people to support causes they care about. Strong community foundations are led and staffed by people who know their communities, its needs and its leaders, and who can collaborate to solve the local challenges. Paul Plagenz serves as the Chief Executive Office of the Moline Foundation. Mr. Plagenz holds a bachelor's degree in Hospitality Management from The Ohio State University. Prior to his work with the Moline Foundation he served as Events Specialist at Royal Neighbors of America; Vice President of Development for Junior Achievement of the Heartland; Director of Development for the Quad City Symphony Orchestra; Director of Development, Western Illinois University - Quad Cities; Vice President of

Advancement and Engagement; and now currently President and CEO of The Moline Foundation. Mr. Plagenz stated that the Moline Foundation is a community catalyst raising awareness of the vital work of local nonprofits. It uses its organizational strength to raise more money, finds common ground to build lasting partnerships, effectively solve challenges, and serves the Quad Cities region of Iowa and Illinois. Mr. Plagenz told us that like Rotary, Foundations require people of Action. In 1953 Robert K. Swan decided he wanted to do something to improve his community and he made a \$350,000 donation to start the Moline Foundation. Now, some 71 years later the foundation has grown to over \$9 million in assets and has made donations exceeding \$45 million to area non-profits. The Foundation manages funds for 24 non-profit organizations that retain their own autonomy, but prefer to allow the Foundation to handles their investments. Overall the Foundations has 100 "partner funds" that with various level of involmt work within the Moline Foundations's structure. When asked if the current economic climate has impacted the Foundations, Mr. Plagenz stated that they use a rolling 16 quarter economic sample as their indicator of the market and investment climate. He noted that the poor economic climate has led to people holding on to their money to a great degree and as a result the amount of gifts made to the Foundation has decreased. He noted in particular that the economy has greatly impacted larger gifts. The Foundation requires a minmum investment of \$10,000 for being an endowed Foundation fund. Donors are allowed to build up to that amount with multiple annual contributions. When asked about the relationship between the Moline Foundation and other entites such as the Rock Island Foundation and the The Quad Cities Community Foundation he noted that the various Foundations collaborate and work together. Each has geographic areas of emphasis, although in many cases those areas overlap. As an example he noted that the Moline Foundaton made a significant contribution to the new 30th Street Rock Island Public Library branch. He said the main difference is in the size of the Foundation and what they can do. He emphasized that they do not compete. We thank Mr. Plagenz for his informative presentation and we appreciate the great work done in our community by the Moline Foundation.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Let's talk Polio –

The global health community has the knowledge and tools to extinguish polio. When it will deliver on that promise depends largely on funding for everything from reaching children with vaccines to battling misinformation. The last mile of the journey, as campaigners point out, is the toughest. In April, The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) launched an appeal for \$4.8 billion to fund its 2022-26 strategy for speeding up outbreak response times, making vaccination campaigns more effective, and gaining access to hard-to-reach areas. Germany is co-hosting a pledging event for the GPEI strategy at the World Health Summit in Berlin in October. A funding partnership between Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation generates up to \$150 million each year to contribute to the effort.

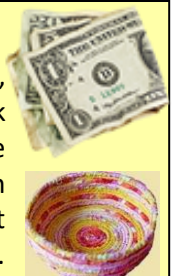

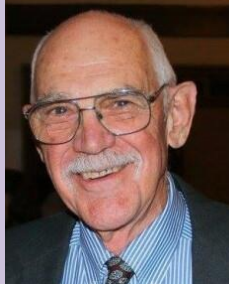
DR. LARRY TADLOCK REMEMBERED AND HONORED

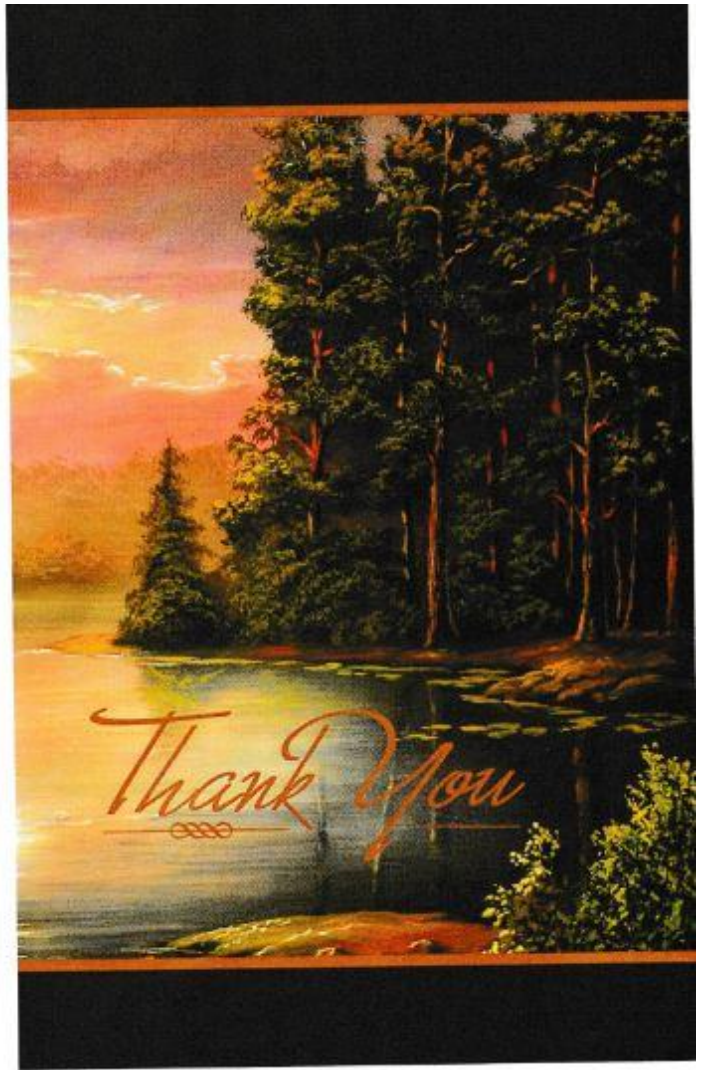
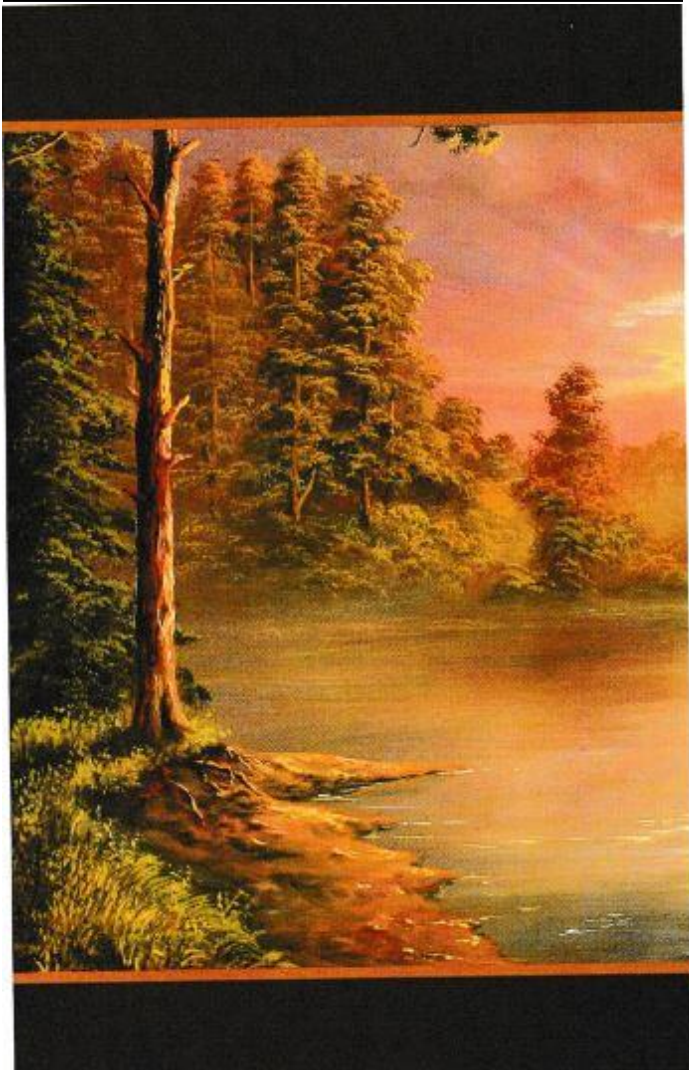
On October 5th, Rock Island Rotary lost one of our most beloved and dedicated members. Larry joined Rotary International in 1969 in Granite City and upon moving to the Quad Cities transferred his membership to the Rock Island Rotary Club in 1971. He served as our President in 1974-75. In 1982 Larry was the first to receive the prestigious A.T. Peara Award subsequent to establishment of the award which honored A.T. Peara in 1981. He was the driving force behind establishing the Milan Rotary Club and earned Paul Harris +10 recognition for his support and dedication to the Rotary International Foundation. He was a Rotary Foundation Benefactor, signifying that he had notified The Rotary Foundation that he had made provisions for the Foundation in his final estate plan. Larry was also a supporter of our Club Foundation and the family requested that memorials for Larry be made to either the Rock Island Rotary Foundation or to Friendship Manor.

Today JoAn Tadlock, Larry's wife of over 68 years attended our meeting along with daughters Sherri Tadlock-DeVrieze, Jann Tadlock-Koert, and Larianne Tadlock-Richards. They brought with them a large stack of donations given in honor of Larry for our Club Foundation. They also brought an incredible hand-turned cherry wood bowl made by Larry. For many years Larry provided many of his wood-working wonders for use as Rotary raffle prizes. This cherry wood bowl was one that JoAn particularly liked, and she had kept it. In looking for a bowl to donate to Rotary, she came across her favorite "cherry" bowl and noticed that Larry had affixed a brass Rotary International Seal to the bottom of the bowl. It was also numbered and signed by Larry. Realizing that Larry had made the bowl intending to donate it to Rotary, she decided to fulfill his wishes and donated it to our Club today. Determining that Larry would have wanted his work to promote and encourage further giving, it was decided that the bowl would be auctioned to our members with proceeds going to the Club Foundation in Larry's name. Bidding started at \$25 and was fast and furious. The chance to own the final "Dr. Larry" bowl and to honor his memory saw bids go from \$25 to \$50, then to \$100! More members got into the action and the bids briskly passed through the \$200s and into the \$300s. With no slowing down bids continue through the \$300s to the \$400s and then \$500 was bid by Dr. Bud Phillis. Bill Stengel raised it one more time to \$510. Then Bud answered with \$525. All eyes were on Bill, who after a pause, said "he can have it". The final "Going Once", "Twice", and "Sold" was called. Congratulations to Dr. Bud Phillis, proud owner of the final "Dr. Larry bowl". After the meeting JoAnn said, "Larry would be amazed!". The answer was, "Larry's bowl was an incredible piece of beautiful craftsmanship, but the real value was not in the bowl, but in who made it!"

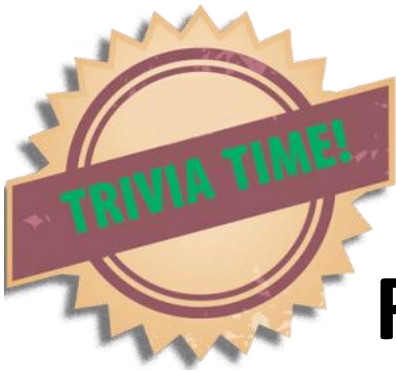
