(TMBC). TMBC is the only program in the Quad Cities region that is Black-owned, Black-led and focused on empowering the Black youth, Black families, and Black communities in our area. Ms. Singleton says, "While our programs are Black-focused, TMBC is open to everyone, regardless of race, religion, age, or disability. Our diverse reach offers support and place-making to the Black community and access points into the community for other Quad Cities communities and groups. TMBC's has 6 Core Values: *Welcoming - While most of our programs address the needs of the Black community, we welcome the entire Quad Cities to become a part of our village. We serve as a bridge that connects the Black community to external groups, and in-turn provides access points for non-Black communities to experience the rich Black culture of the Quad Cities. *Connections - We bridge people and organizations together that typically would not connect. We connect those who enact policy decisions to undervalued community members to ensure the needs of all Quad Cities residents are heard and addressed. *Sense of Belonging - We give the Black population of the Quad Cities a strong sense of belonging to this area by providing unique opportunities. A strong sense of belonging is known to bring better collaboration, population retention, and increased overall standard of living. *Hope - While we are not a faith-based organization, we work to instill hope in the hearts and minds of all in our community. We ensure hopefulness by making success available to one of the most impacted communities within the Quad Cities. *Safe Haven - We understand there are many dangers in the world. We work to be a constant safe haven for our youth, families, and community. We provide a protected, non-violent environment to ensure learning and empowerment can be done in peace. *Economic Empowerment - We understand there are current economic disparities present in the Black community of the Quad Cities. Through our work and community partnerships, we work to alleviate these disparities and empower businesses across the Quad Cities. Ms. Singleton listed an impressive number of services provided by the Lincoln Center including: a Learning Center with full Library; a Career Center; a Meeting Room available for community use; a Business Center equipped with computers and printers for public use; and an on site Notary Public. They house 20 black owned business and not for profit organizations, and offer an array of programs including "Cops & Kids" that provides books for squad cars and encourages police to give them to children they meet in their daily routine; parenting classes; sports referee training & license assistance; and monthly health programs on all aspects of health. When asked what her greatest challenge was in getting the Lincoln Center up and successfully running, Ms. Singleton said, "You may not believe this, but the toughest challenge was earning the trust of the Black community. They have been promised so much and seen so many programs, they needed to see that we were going to do what we said we would. We stick to that to this day, we do everything we promise to do, and have earned their trust." Thanks you Tracy for a very enlightening program.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Sometime in 2010, in Lakshadweep, an archipelago of 36 islands near Sri Lanka, a boat accident claimed the life of Neona, an 18-month-old girl. In memory of their daughter, her parents got together with The Rotary Club of Cochin and started Neona, a free heart surgery program for children with congenital heart defects in Colombo, Sri Lanka. Recently, five children from Colombo who were born with congenital heart defects were successfully operated on in Kochi under the program. The Rotary Foundation's sponsored project was jointly implemented by the Rotary Club of Cochin West and Rotary Club of Colombo West at a cost of Rs 2 crore (US\$243,955). According to The New Indian Express, in a report published on November 5, 2022, the heart surgery was done at Amrita Institute of Medical Sciences and Research Center, Kochi.

A total of 65 children will benefit from the project. Additionally, Sri Lankan doctors and nurses will be trained at Amrita Hospital. Rotary District 3201 Governor S Rajmohan Nair inaugurated the project at Panampilly Nagar KMA Hall.


PATIENCE IS A VIRTUE!

Last May Bud Phillis and Bob Swanson were invited to make a presentation about our Kenya Water Project to high school students attending the RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Award) Camp in Lowden State Park near Oregon, Illinois. There were about 50 students from all over our Rotary District in attendance. Bud and Bob made the trip taking our Water Filter and the Power Point Presentation they have shown to dozens of Rotary Clubs over the past three years. In August we received notice that the Interact Club at Rocky want to purchase a filter as their International Project for 2022-23. Five of their members were at RYLA and said they remembered the presentation about the filters but didn't remember that it was our Club that founded the project. This past Wednesday we received the following email:

"Hello! I'm Samantha Sanford. I'm on the board of the Rochelle Township High School Interact Club. I listened to you speak at RYLA in May this year, and our Interact Club is interested in raising money to help fund the water filters. Is this still a project you are working on, and would this be a project we could do through you?"

Needless to say, we welcomed the Rochelle Interact Club into our project and have provided them with brochures, photos, and a power point presentation. We have received confirmation that they are definitely "IN" and have begun fundraising to purchase at least one, if not more, water filters.

When we made the drive to Oregon we had no idea if any of those in attendance would be motivated to join our project. It took three months to hear from the first group from RYLA who wanted to join the effort. It was six months for Rochelle, the second student group from RYLA to join. PATIENCE IS A VIRTUE! Two more filters mean 140 more children will be saved from water borne disease. The most common waterborne diseases are Typhoid Fever, Cholera, Giardia, Dysentery, Escherichia Coli (E. coli), Hepatitis A, and Salmonella. All can kill and all are preventable. We are eagerly waiting for the third group to call! Think it is not a significant problem in 2022? Check the next page!



Each year, waterborne diseases afflict hundreds of millions of people, primarily those living without safe, accessible water in developing countries. Of the seven most common waterborne diseases in the world (listed above), diarrhea is the central symptom. The latest research shows that diarrhea is the second leading cause of death for children under the age of five, causing more childhood deaths than malaria, AIDS, and measles combined. That's hundreds of thousands of deaths. Think it's not a problem in the United States? The CDC estimates that waterborne pathogens cause approximately 7.2 million illnesses, 118,000 hospitalizations, and 6,630 deaths every year **in the United State.** In addition to the health burden, waterborne diseases account for \$3.33 billion annually in direct healthcare costs. Globally, 785 million people lack even a basic drinking-water service. That's over twice the population of the United States! Drinking contaminated water can transmit diseases and back in 2017 nearly 1.6 million people died from diarrheal diseases. Our project has now reached 19,000 children, a great accomplishment, but only a small dent in the challenge of providing safe water to those who need it.
