PHILANTHROPHY HEIDI HUISKAMP COLLINS

Heidi Huiskamp Collins is a Quad-Cities girl. She grew up in Rock Island and graduated from Augustana College, with honors, with a B.A. in Business

Administration and a minor in Economics. After graduation, she re-located to the Chicagoland area and went to work for a large bank. She later moved to the San Francisco Bay area where she worked for a nationwide financial firm. She moved her family back to the Quad-Cities in the early 1990s to raise her children and returned to work at Blackhawk Bank & Trust where she had

worked summers and school breaks as both a high school and college student. In 2005, Ms. Collins earned her Series 7 and Series 66 securities licenses and started the Wealth Management Division at Blackhawk Bank. She served as a financial advisor and Manager of the Trust and Investment Departments. In 2006 she received her master's degree at the Graduate School of Banking at the University of Wisconsin/Madison where she was Valedictorian and President of her class. In May 2017 Heidi started Huiskamp Collins Investments, LLC. Beyond her professional 40 plus years in investing and 20 years in financial planning. Huiskamp Collins has made a major mark in the Illinois Quad Cities as a philanthropist and community leader. She is a director of the W Gerard & Colleen A Huiskamp Foundation and co-chaired the fundraising campaign for the new Rock Island 30th Street Branch Library. She single-handedly funded the new playground at Earl Hanson Elementary School. The donation was more than \$150,000. "A big part of my philanthropy is modeling for women that they can step into their power and show how women philanthropists can make an impact," said Huiskamp Collins. A few examples of her many other philanthropic ventures include: a gift of \$100,000 to the Center for Youth and Family Solutions (CYFS), a nonprofit counseling and child welfare social work agency in the Quad Cities to fund a Police Social Work partnership project that has been created in conjunction with the City of Moline Police Department. She was a major donor to purchase the Heart of Hope Ministries a new "Giving Hope Truck" used to deliver food and toiletries to the elderly and disabled. Heidi also provided a \$100,000 donation as a match to any donation supporting Born Learning Academies for kindergarten readiness. She began her comments stating that November is National Philanthropy Month. She then thanked Rotary for the philanthropy and service we provide to our community and the world. She noted that philanthropy involves much more than giving money, commenting that giving time and talent as equally important. She said, "Philanthropy is not just writing checks. We can all be philanthropists". You give what you can give. She told of her earlier years when the most she could give was her time and talent, so she served on Boards and mentored young girls. As her abilities changed she began giving her treasure along with her time and talent. Ms. Huiskamp-Collins spoke particularly of the impact women can have in philanthropy, pointing out that women control more wealth in the United States than men. She said women need to, "Step up". She also pointed out that in 2017 women accounted for 29% of all new entrepreneurships and that last year that number had grown to 49%. She stated that women tend to live longer than men and tend to marry men who are older therefore substantial amounts of wealth are being transferred to women via inheritance. She stated that philanthropy changes lives. She closed saying, "With great blessing comes great responsibility" and urged all to be philanthropists whether by time, talent, or treasure. Nelly Cheboi grew up in a rural village in Kenya (Kenya is a link with our water project helping children in rural schools). The situation there was dire. Circumstances forced Nelly to raise her younger sister when Neily was just nine years old. She desperately wanted to change the narrative of kids growing up in communities like hers. She wanted to fix poverty! (Sounds like Service Above Self!)

Through arduous work and determination, Nelly landed a full scholarship to Augustana College. Coming to the United States and studying computer science gave her the platform to accelerate her impact. As an undergrad, she invested all her income from various campus jobs into her community back in Kenya. She built a school, Zawadi, in Kenya and later started *TechLit Africa*. She also competed on the Augustana Women's Cross Country Team and the Augustana Women's Track & Field team. Nelly graduated from Augustana in 2016. While there she received the *Richard Swanson Humanitarian Award*, named in honor of fellow Rotarian Kai Swanson's father.

TechLit Africa is a non-profit American organization that redistributes recycled technology to build computer labs in African schools. Nelly's organization has already built 10 computer labs in rural Kenya school and is currently working on her next 100 labs. Nelly reports they already are serving 4,000 students and 20 teachers. By next year she will have around 40,000 students and 200 teachers!

TechLit Africa is unique. They teach classes that are relevant and hire local teachers to make sure of it. They train their teachers to run the computer labs in their own community, and they meet every day to improve their classes. Nelly said, "We are unlocking a world of opportunities to these kids. They will be inspired to take on a dozen careers: they will have the skills to tap into the global economy straight from the village." She added, "This is my life's work because I know firsthand how awful poverty is. We plan to do this for the whole of rural Africa, positioning ourselves to 10x our growth year after year. TechLit is my opportunity to fix poverty and for good this time." Recently she traveled to Mogotio, a township in Kenya and said she had the "Joy and the privilege of teaching over 1000 kids Most of them would have most likely never seen a computer their whole life. I myself first used one when I was eighteen. We also just shipped 200 workstations this past week for our next 10 computer labs."

Last December, Forbes named Nelly to their honored, "30 Under 30" list. She was also named a CNN Hero of the Year candidate and has recently been notified that **she is one of ten finalists for CNN Hero of the Year**, an award that provides \$100,000 plus well-deserved recognition and help with further growth.
