Argrow's House is a safe space where free services are offered daily for women healing from violence and abuse in the greater Quad Cities area. Argrow's House is also a successful social enterprise where women healing from violence and abuse create beautiful bath products that provide a living wage for themselves in a safe space that celebrates who they are. Dr. Kit serves as a minister at Grace City Church. Kit resides in Davenport, Iowa with her husband, Pastor Dwight L. Ford, and children; Imani and Justice. Argrow's House is named after Rev. Argrow Margaret Warren, grandmother of Argrows's House founder Dr. Kit Ford. Rev. Warren lived through a violent marriage, but embraced such courage and love, according to Dr. Ford who stated, "We wanted to empower women mind, body, spirit, as well as financially. So we started a bath and body business where women healing from abuse can create beautiful all natural bath and body products that provide a living wage for themselves in a safe space that celebrates who they are. For Women, Made by Women, Survivor Strong!" Products include soaps, bath balms, bath balm salts, shower balms, body lotion, body butter, essential oils, and hand sanitizer. Apparel and various products from around the world via #survivorstrongmarket and Nigerian #survivormade market, plus gift sets and gift cards are also part of Argrow's inventory. Argrow's house offers a support group to help survivors heal after abuse, and let them know that they are not alone on their healing journey. They also have a monthly Food Box Delivery/Pick-up for Women and Children in Need in partnership with with the River Bend Food Bank with the goal of providing a food box to as many women in the community as possible. Healthy, nourishing food is distributed for pick up or delivery monthly! They host a weekly Family Fun Day on Saturdays atheir their 2313 44th Street location and welcome all women and children for fellowship, family and fun! Argrow's House also uses artistic methods to enhance mental health through painting, crafting, and other art therapy exercises. Taught by trained art therapist, Rachel Kratz! All women and children of all skill levels are welcome. Argrow's House has two facilities. The original Argrow's House in Davenport is now use strictly as a housing shelter for abused women. Women needing safe shelter can stay in the home up to six months. While there they must comply with strict rules and structure. Their other faility is located in Moline at 2313 - 44th Street. That facility is the manufacturing and sales site for Argrow's House products. Tours may be arranged to see how the products are made and regular store hours are offered for those wanting to shop the wide variety of products available. Argrow's House products are also available at many local gift shops, hospital gifts shops, and at the lowa Machine Shed restaurant. Ms. Thomas stresses that the values of Argrow's House are peace and safety, inclusiveness, empowerment, and a strong sense of community. She said abused women often enter very shy and afraid to speak. After going through the Argrow's program they are able to return to fully productive lives with self-confidence She also stated that those interested in the Argrow's House products can shop online at www.argrowshouse.org. FOUNDATION MINUTE

The Rotary Club of Peterborough announced Friday November 18, that the club's application for a Rotary Foundation of Canada Grant to fund vocational training to women in Badikhel, Nepal has received approval.

In a news report by Alex Schummer of The Examiner Reporter, the grant of \$67,874 USD will fund the training of 140 Nepalese women in skills that will enable them to work in their chosen professions or to run their own businesses. "Women in Nepal are less likely to be educated by their families for a lot of different reasons," said Marie Press, co-chair of the club's international committee. "So, we've decided to provide these women training that would give them really good skills such as plumber, electrician, teacher, seamstress."

Nepalese women often work a lot of menial and even dangerous jobs like construction, for little money, explained Press. These skills will allow them to earn a living income and support their families, she added. "It's hard to believe it, but the caste system still exists in Nepal," she said. "So, women have lower castes have a lot less opportunity."

Nepal has the sixth highest rate of child marriages in the world, explained Press. Rotarians hope this training will promote female empowerment and self-sustainability that will have a long-term effect in Nepal, she added. "Research has proven when women are the breadwinners, or earn a really good wage, they are more likely than men to put that money back into their family, especially educating their own children," she said. "And Rotary is really about sustainability and sustainable project, so we know that we're going to be impacting generations, not just these 140 women."

JOHN PHILLIPS PROVIDES INFO ON OUR CLUB FOUNDATION

Club Foundation Development Chairman John Phillips took a few minutes to provide some valuable information regarding our Club Foundation. He noted that the foundation was created in 2008 as a result of a generous bequest of \$200,000 from the estate of Stan Harris. This Foundation is intended to support projects and programs that benefit the people of Rock Island. The Board's policy is to use only the net income and appreciated value of the fund to further the goals of Rock Island Rotary to help the Rock Island community. The Foundation board is comprised of Rock Island Rotarians. Since its creation the Club Foundation has steadily grown and using a 3% annual allotment from the earnings of the endowed funds has been responsible for major funding of the Entrepreneurship Program at Rock Island High School; Purchase of a Van for Spring Forward Learning Center; Providing lights for "Rotary Field" at the Rock Island Girls Softball Complex; Support for the New 30th Street Rock Island Branch Library, Funding to help build a public community shower facility at Christian Care; and numerous other projects. He noted that when members indicate a "donation to the Foundation" that is typically taken to mean the Rotary International Foundation. To donate to our Club Foundation, members need to specify "donation to the Club Foundation". John stated that so far this year 28 members have donated to the Club Foundation for a total of \$7,800+; 39 members donated to our Birdies for Charity campaign and those funds were dedicated to the Club Foundation. To date this year a total of \$14,752 has been received. The Club Foundation recognizes members for their support at various levels of giving: \$25,000 and up are "Sponsors" and include Tricia Barron, Stan Coin, and Don Peterson (deceased). \$5,000 and up are "Patrons" and include John Wetzel and Ruth Lee. \$500 and up are "Friends" and include Earnie Beane, Howard Beck, John Daly, Jeff Dismer, Marcia Green, Bill (deceased) & Marvel Green, Tom Hammar, Ardo Holmgrain, Doug Hultquist, Kevin Koski, Frank Lambert, Fred & Nancy Luckenbill, Mark Mayeski, Anne McGlynn, John Oliger, John Phillips, Bud Phillis, Sue Rector, Gary Rowe, Molly Shattuck, John Slover, Bob Swanson, Larry Tadlock (deceased) and Mark Zimmerman.
