

Ryan's love of the outdoors shaped his career path in landscaping, leading him to the Botanical Center, where he worked in both the marketing and education

departments before becoming executive director. He is a native of Palatine, Illinois and studied English at Bradley University in Peoria. Prior to his current position, Mr. Willie served as Director Of Development for the Humane Society Of Scott County and from 2016-18 was Marketing Manager for the Quad City Botanical Center. He was excited to continue programs and experiences that make the gardens the asset they are today while developing new reasons to bring people and plants together in fun and meaningful ways. Mr. Wille gave a brief historical account of the Botanical Center noting that next year will be the 25th anniversary of the Center. He stated for 10 years prior to the building's creation a committee of dedicate citizens fundraised to bring the concept into reality culminating with the Atrium and indoor gardens opening in June of 1998. Since then the dining rooms, offices and storage areas have been added to the building. Outside the Children's Gardens were added in 2015, with the entry plaza funded with over a \$100,000 donation from Rock Island Rotary as our club's Centennial Project under the leadership of then president Anne McGlynn. With the children's gardens came the addition of the to scale Mississippi River and Headwaters display, all built to allow children and visitors in general to have hands-on, close up experiences with the gardens. From the headwaters to the Mississippi Delta in Louisiana, complete with aligator the river is displayed to scale with appropriate plantings along the way. More recently added were Camp Blue Bell and the Ability Garden designed with full ADA compliance to ensure disabled visitors can also have hands-on expereneces at the Center. Ryan noted that the Botanical Center now attracts between 50— 60,000 visitors annually. Between 10-12,000 local students are enrolled in formal programs offered by the Center. Over 7,100 patio palm trees were sent home with students this past year. Mr Wille then listed the many programs offered by the Botanical Center which include the Explorers Club, the Eco Kids Camp, the Eco Arts Camp, The Fall Home Plant Sale, the Terrarium Building Classes offered at three levels, and a new Mission to Mars Program that was highly successful in teaching kids the importance of plants in creating a sustainable living habitat. He also noted that the Winter Nights Winter Lights project is one of the largest fundraising events for the Center and attracts more than 15,000 visitors each year. He also let us in on future plans for the Center which include converting a bus into a mobile greenhouse which will allow them to greatly expand their impact at local schools and will also allow them to participate in activities such as the Farmer's Market, when plants can be sold out of the Mobile Greenhouse. There are also plans to expande the Childrends Garden in 2023 by adding a Story Book Garden, which will incorporate books with the garderns and make books avaialble to children who visit. Another new and exciting project is "Plants of the World – People Behind the Plants" that will incorporate real life stories of immigrants from all parts of the world and the plants on exhibit from their home countries. 

ROTARY SUPPORTS NARRATIVES QUAD CITIES

Dr. Annette Sundfor Clevenger is the Founder, Executive Director, and Life Coach of Narratives Quad Cities. Annette is a native of Rock Island and graduated from Rock Island High School. She studied at Illinois State University where she earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology and Sociology. She went on to earn her Doctorate degree in Clinical Psychology from Wheaton College. She returned to the Quad Cities and established her own private practice. For seventeen years Dr. Clevenger has strived to provide quality counseling services to adults, children, couples, and families in our community. She founded Narratives to work with Quad City youth. She believes the transition from adolescence to adulthood can be difficult - especially when you don't have a high school degree, can't find a good paying



job or don't have any supportive role models in your life. Narratives works to empower Quad City young adults (ages 17-24) to find their purpose and path in life. Today Rotary Community Grants Chairman Frank Lambert presented a donation of \$2,000 to Dr. Clevenger for general supplies needed to help the young adults. FOUNDATION MINUTE

Rotary International's Month of Disease Prevention & Treatment.

While Polio eradication has been one of Rotary's top goals, the disease has yet to be completely eradicated from the face of the earth. To this end, the Church of Latter-Day Saints is heading a major initiative with Rotary International and UNICEF in this report by Mary Richards.

Areas of the world that had made progress against polio are now seeing outbreaks again, and children are becoming paralyzed. The COVID-19 pandemic delayed the delivery and use of immunization services, and multiple countries lost ground where the disease was once eradicated.

Under-immunizations for tetanus also affect women and children in many countries as well.

To raise immunization efforts, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints announced Friday \$10 million in donations to organizations working in Afghanistan, Pakistan and several African countries, said the announcement on www.ChurchofJesusChrist.org

Half of the \$10 million total — \$5 million — is going to Rotary International to fight polio. This portion of the Church's grant will help African countries regain progress lost to COVID-19 in countries such as Malawi, Mozambique, Democratic Republic of the Congo, and Nigeria. And any donation to Rotary International is matched two to one by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee, said, "Rotary is grateful for this very generous contribution from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The funding comes at a critical time for polio eradication efforts and will help protect children from lifelong paralysis due to the poliovirus."

WHAT DO THE HOLIDAYS MEAN FOR ALL OF US?

Rotarians all over the world and even in our own Rock Island Club come from all different nationalities, cultures. and religions. Yet, we all get along, respect one another, and work toward common goals of world peace, better health, quality education, economic improvement, and equal opportunities for all. Thinking about the holidays, we may celebrate Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, or any number of other days of celebration recognized by the widely diverse cultures of the world. The one thing those of us in American can celebrate together is that we live in one of a relatively few places in the world where no matter what our beliefs we have the freedom to celebrate our own way and in our own set of beliefs and customs. There are parts of the world where Christians cannot openly celebrate Christmas. The same is true of those of the Jewish faith, the Hindu faith, Buddhists, and the Islamic faith. We are so fortunate, and yet religious freedom and freedom of expression are so engrained in our American upbringing that such treasured freedoms are often taken for granted. Some feel we are just lucky to be here, but a closer inspection of history tells us that luck had very little to do with it. The early settlers of the New World were more often than not trying to escape persecution in one form or another. Whether religious persecution, taxation without representation, racial and national origin prejudices, America seemed to be the place where all could live, worship, read, and speak what they wished. That freedom didn't come easy. Thousands died in the Revolutionary War to establish a country where freedom of religion, freedom of speech, and freedom of thought, and freedom to have and hold property are considered God given rights. Thousands more died in the Civil war to extend those rights to all men and women in the land. More were persecuted and wrongfully treated, and many died in fighting for integration, voting rights, and equal justice. That's not to say everything is fine and all issues are resolved, but it is a testament to our country and system of governing and living together that has allowed for the tremendous incredible progress that been made while much of the world still fails to recognize the basic human rights of individuals. In America there are still those with prejudices and biases, but no longer can they impose those prejudices and biases on others. When they try, they fail and the system that our early patriots created has evolved and ensured that the causes of justice and freedom are protected under the law. Unfortunately, we are now hearing such phrases as "cancel culture" and speakers being forced off platforms of public discourse. These are true threats to democracy. We all should be thankful for our freedoms and our country, and we all need to understand that what we have, resulted from people giving their lives to ensure that all could be heard, that all could then decide what they believe is right and all could have the right and freedom to profess their beliefs without fear of persecution or ridicule. So, in this holiday season, whatever your particular religion, culture, or beliefs might be, let's come together in celebrating our freedom to each be exactly what we want to be and not what others tell us we should be. And let's also celebrate democracy and the system of self-government that gives us the right to express ourselves as we please. Let's hope that our efforts through Rotary can make the world a better place for all and that all can celebrate as they choose. For all of us the Holidays should mean a time to be thankful. Did you know -, the iconic phrase "I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it." frequently attributed to the French philosopher Voltaire, wasn't actually said by Voltaire. It was in truth written by a very wise woman, who wrote the phrase as a summary of Voltaire's beliefs. The phrase was in her 1906 biography called The Friends of Voltaire by English writer Beatrice Evelyn Hall.
