Taking us on a world tour of holiday music the choir began with "NOEL" An African Spiritual based on Kituba dialect from the Congo with accompanying drums. That was followed by a short novelty song with a great message "TURN OFF YOUR CELL PHONE". (We noticed a number of Rotarians reaching for their phones after this reminder). The next selection was "SING WE NOW OF CHRISTMAS" a Traditional French, 15th Century Christmas hymn. Moving

across Europe to Germany the choir gave a spirit rendition of "O TANNENBAUM" frequently referred to as "O Christmas Tree". Taking us back to France, the singers performed "BRING A TORCH, JEANETTE, ISABELLA" a Christmas carol which originated from the Provence region of France in the 17th century. The carol was first published in France, and was subsequently translated into English in the 18th century. The choir then performed "LO, HOW A ROSE E'ER BLOOMING" a Christmas carol and Marian hymn of German origin. The lyrics first appeared in print in 1599 and has since been published with a varying number of verses and in several translations. It is most commonly sung to a melody harmonized by the German composer Michael Praetorius in 1609. That was followed by a very contemporary version of THE LITTLE DRUMMER BOY (originally known as "Carol of the Drum") is a popular Christmas song written by American composer Katherine Kennicott Davis in 1941. First recorded in 1951 by the Trapp Family. In this contemporary version the words were accompanied by very talented choir members adding vocal percussion, sometimes know as "beat boxing". The next selection was GOD REST YE MERRY GENTLEMEN a traditional English Christmas Carol. The composer is unknown but there are records of it being sung within the Christian Church since the 15th century. The hymn was first put into print in 1760 but made available to a wider audience when William B. Sandy included a version of it in his publication Christmas Carols Ancient and Modern (1833). The version presented by the Chamber Singers was in the style of a round. That was followed by an upbeat version of JINGLE BELLS, one of the best-known and most commonly sung American songs. It was written by James Lord Pierpont and published under the title "The One Horse Open Sleigh" in 1857. The singers then performed Kelly Clarkson's 2021 Christmas song GLOW. Next the ladies of the chorus took center stages with SANTA BABY first recorded by Ertha Kitt in 1953. The song was banned in a number of southern states as to "suggestive" for a Christmas song. Nationwide it was the best selling Christmas song of 1953 and had been since been recorded by scores of performers including Madonna, Kylie Minogue, Taylor Swift, Trisha Yearwood, Ariana Grande and Gwen Stefani. Not to be outdone, the chorus guys responded with their version of Billy Gilman's WARM AND FUZZY in barbershop style. The group then performed the 2020 Pentatonix release, THANK YOU. The concluded with ROUND THE GLORY MANGER by contemporary American Composer K. Lee Scott. The singers received a standing ovation and blessed us with a very short encore, FA LA LA LA LA LA LA. As always the kids were great!

ROTARIAN ARDO HOLMGRAIN HONORED

Rock Island Rotary visited Friendship Manor Thursday, December 1st to honor fellow Rotarian, Ardo Holmgrain. Holmgrain, a retired engineer from the Army Corps of Engineers, joined Rock Island Rotary in 1967 and served as our club's president for 1988-89. He was previously honored as a "Paul Harris Fellow +7" in recognition of his generous donations to the Rotary International Foundation. Mr. Holmgrain was instrumental in the creation of the club's highest honor, the A.T. Peara Award named in honor of Absolom T. Peara. The Award is a lifetime award and may be won just once by each recipient. It is presented to the Rock Island Rotarian deemed to best represent the ideals of Rotary International, which are summed up in the Rotary motto, "Service Above Self", and in Rotary's "Four Way Test" which states, "In the things we say and do: Is it the Truth, Is it Fair to All Concerned, Will it Build Goodwill and Better Friendships, Will it be Beneficial to all concerned". Holmgrain was also a key figure in founding the Rock Island Summerfest an annual event previously held in downtown Rock Island. He was named a "Friend of Rotary International" in recognition of his financial commitment to Rotary philanthropy. Ardo and his wife Carolyn served as a host family for a visiting Rotary Youth Exchange student and sponsored their daughter's participation as an outgoing exchange student to Australia. Mr. Holmgrain was surprised by the visit of a select group of his closest friends from Rotary who came to present Mr. Holmgrain with three more honors: He received a Certificate of Recognition listing his many accomplishments and service in Rotary; a pin recognizing him for 50 years of perfect attendance to weekly Rotary meetings, and elevation of Holmgrain to "Honorary Member" status. Honorary Status is achieved only by vote of the club's Board of Directors in recognition of a member's commitment to the Club over their years of membership. It is a rare and unique award and has been bestowed only a handful of times in the club's more than 108 years of existence. In making the presentation, Eric Westphall, our incoming president stated, "Honorary Membership in Rotary is a privilege, which we believe you have earned. As an honorary member you are exempt from paying dues; you are entitled to attend all meetings and enjoy all other privileges in the club. I now present you with the lapel pin by which your fellow Rotarians and the public at large will recognize you as an honorary Rotarian. We trust that you will take the opportunity to continue to enjoy the fellowship of Rotary and assist our community in service through Rotary". Holmgrain, who will celebrate his 95th birthday February 4th was humble and a bit emotional in his acceptance of the honors he received, thanking all who came to the presentation, saying "I will proudly wear this pin and deeply appreciate the honor."
