John Lohman, the Founder, Co-owner and Group Publisher of the Corridor Media Group, Inc., a family-owned media company based in North Liberty, Iowa. They have been publishing the weekly Corridor Business Journal (CBJ) since 2004 in the Cedar Rapids and Iowa City region. On November 30, 2021, they launched the Quad Cities Regional Business Journal (QCBJ) online and began publishing their first printed version of QCBJ on January 24, 2022. The print publication is mailed to paid subscribers. The journal covers

local and regional business news in the greater Quad Cities area, including the counties of Rock Island, Henry and Mercer in Illinois and Scott, Clinton and Muscatine counties in Iowa. They do their best to have a balance of news coverage from both states and cover the small start-ups to the large corporations and everything in between. All news content is original and locally or regionally based. In addition to the website and the bi-weekly print publication, QCBJ also publishes numerous podcasts and e-newsletters as well as host several events including Forty Under 40, Mid-Year Economic Review, 90 Ideas in 90 Minutes and others. Lohman is a Rotarian in the Iowa City Downtown Club and his daughter is a member of the Liberty High School Interact Club at Liberty High School in North Liberty, Iowa.

Lohman earned his bachelors and masters degrees in Journalism and Communication from the University of Iowa. He is definitely a diehard "Hawkeye' having served as student body president and in costume as "Herky the Hawk". His first



job after college was with the Cedar Rapids Journal. He was hired to start a lowa City branch of the Journal and subsequently fired when it was decided not to expand into lowa City. He was so upset about being fired that he was determined to never again be in that position. The only way to ensure that was to start his own business. He did take a job working for the Duane Arnold Energy Center (DAEC), lowa's only nuclear power plant located eight miles northwest of Cedar Rapids. In 2004 he gave birth to the weekly Corridor Business Journal in his basement. Providing local business news for the "corridor" the area running from lowa City to Cedar Rapids with a population of approximately 500,000. In 2008 the Mayor of Bettendorf urged Lohman to do a

similar plublication for the Quad Cities. Deeming it not the right time to expand, he held the idea in the back of his head. In 2020 he was again urged to create a Quad Cities Business Journal this time by the CEO of Shive Hattery, headquartered in Cedar Rapids. He felt the time was now right. Lohman developed a business plan, hired a team he considers the best business journalists in the midwest and the Quad Cities Business Journal was born in 2021. In addition to their print edition available by subscription, they also offer a free daily on-line economic update pod cast. They also host events including an upcoming midyear Economic Review Luncheon with nationally respected economists along with local business leaders. Currently there are 500 paid subscribers of the Journal with a goal of 1,500 which would put the Quad Cities Journal on an equal par with the Corridor Journal. We are very pleased that one of our members, Kenda Burrows, is senior editor of the venture. Thank you Mr. Lohman for an extremely interesting and informative program.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 1 of February World Understanding Month and RI's Peace & Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month.

In order to fulfill their mission, since 2002, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1600 fellows from different corners of the world. They are now working on peace and development initiatives in more than 140 countries. With the motto "Doing Good in the World", the Rotary Foundation has planted seeds for an era that is the basis of the world's leading humanitarian organization, The Rotary Foundation.

The Rotary Foundation Fellowship Awards are divided into two categories in order to accommodate the most deserving and eligible candidates without any ambiguities. The First is the Rotary Scholarships for master's students. The Second is The Rotary Fellowships for the professional development certificate program. In both programs, the focus remains on peace and development issues. This innovative program merges a strong, academic understanding of the roots of conflict with practical tactics for solving real-world problems.

A 2019 graduate of San Diego State University, Honors College, Nancy Nguyen is one of 50 young leaders from around the world who have been awarded a fellowship by the Rotary Foundation. She will be attending the University of Queensland in Australia for the Masters of Peace and Conflict Studies, an 18-month fully-funded program. According to an online Rotary report, Nguyen will be one of 12 Rotary Peace Fellows studying there. Her present role is as a Civic Engagement Community Organizer at the Partnership for the Advancement of New Americans (PANA) in San Diego. She was recognized as a 2021 Women of Distinction in Youth Empowerment by the San Diego Mayor's Office. Nancy's longstanding commitment to peace and international development is reflected in her years of international and local policy, advocacy, civic engagement, and direct-service work.

Ms. Nguyen plans to research peacekeeping effort efforts in Asia as the focus of her Master's Degree dissertation.



Dear Rotarians,

I wanted to make everyone in our district aware of 2 new funds to contribute to in your giving to The Rotary Foundation. The first of these I emailed you about a week ago. That is the Ukraine Response Fund which is being used to help the people of Ukraine in their ongoing recovery efforts.

A second new Disaster Response Fund called the Pakistan Flood Response Fund has also been established. The floods have been devastating by displacing people and destroying crops. Both of these funds are specially earmarked Disaster Response Funds and contributions will be accepted through December 21, 2023. All districts are eligible to apply for Disaster Response Grants to assist in these efforts.

You can make a donation to either of these funds as well as the Annual Fund, Polio Plus, Disaster Response Fund (general), and the World Fund by going to My Rotary and click on Donate. It will immediately take you to the page that allows you to select your fund.
