JERRY JONES West End Revitalization



As Executive Director of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center in Rock Island, Jerry Jones has a vast amount of knowledge regarding the West side of Rock Island, both in terms of what is needed and what might be the most effective reviatlization measures. The King Center serves hundreds of families and children who reside in the area loosely referred to as the "west end". Most citizens think of the area running from 11th Street west to the western boundary of Rock Island. Generally the neighborhood is one of the older areas of the city. Officially the West End area generally covers the Douglas Park, Old Chicago and Longview neighborhoods, although some involvement for the neighborhood extends to the area south of 18th Avenue. Much of the neighborhood organizing activity in the three neighborhoods has been supported by the Community Caring Conference and the King Center. The term "West End" was unofficially used for decades and even appeared in surveys and

official city documents dating to the 1960s. It was during the City's active neighborhood planning period in the 1990s, that the names Longview, Old Chicago and Douglas Park were selected by residents for smaller areas when planning documents were created and neighborhood associations were formed. But the new group liked the idea of not running away from a name, and turning what was once a negative term into a positive dynamic. So, the name "West End" was once again tapped as the moniker, combining the efforts of residents in all three neighborhoods. Jerry reported that a generous donor funded a study starting in 2019 which was interrupted by Covid and completed in 2022. The study involved seeking community input of much information. From that came a plan and a vision. "The vision is to see the West End of Rock Island to be the preferred place to live and to thrive. That's what ultimately I'd like to see from the results of this assessment, of this plan and this work," Jones said. The study identified some key "disparities," including limited access to healthy food, low economic security, and a severe lack of safe, quality housing. Jerry pointed out the if we don't have basic needs met, then we can't progress. People struggling for survival, cannot plan to live a life. Jones says the next step is to work with West End residents and businesses to put the strategies into action. He noted that the opportunity for progress improved dramatically in 2022 with an influx of funding in CARES grants related to the pandemic, school district improvements, the increase in the minimum wage, and more community attention given to the West end. The plan included recommendations to increase civic capital in the area, build residents assets and income, improve housing stability and quality, increase the economic vitality of the area, and improve the neighborhood infrastructure. Mr. Jones acknowledged that the task is huge and the goals are lofty, but with what he called "collective impact", bringing people together to work on a common vision, he believes the challenge can be met. He said a group of dedicated and passionate citizens are serving as the leadership task force to implement the plan. We thank Jerry, a fellow Rock Island Rotarian for his report and for acting as facilitator of the revitalization effort.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

RI's Month of Water and Sanitation

The Rotary theme for March, Water and Sanitation, asks us to focus on the life changing improvements that we can make through these international projects to provide a more readily available and healthy supply of water to all people. This week's Foundation Minute is an excerpt from this month's message by TRF Trustee Chair, Rotarian Ian H.S. Riseley, published in Rotary.

"Water is essential for life no matter where we live. Yet many of us take it for granted. Think of all the times today you turned on the tap. About 1 in 4 people in the world have quite a different experience when they do -- if they have a tap at all. Today, 2 billion people lack access to safely managed drinking water, according to the United Nations. It is heartbreaking that each year, about 300,000 children under age 5 die from diarrheal diseases caused by poor sanitation, poor hygiene, or unsafe drinking water -- all preventable circumstances.

This is where Rotary comes in. Through your support, The Rotary Foundation provides water and sanitation for countless communities around the globe. Foundational grants have ranged from providing toilets and hygiene education for villages in the Philippines to building infrastructure for year-round access to safe, affordable drinking water in Brazil. The water and sanitation problems that we face are too great for any of us to solve alone. But whether we work with global grant partner districts across the world or with large agencies such as USAID, we are making a difference."

Keep in mind that our own Club has an ongoing water project serving children in remote villages of Kenya. Have you donated toward or purchased a water filter recently? Many of our members bought filters or made donations to our water filter project several years ago. Some of our members purchase a filter (\$350 donation) each year. Checks can be made payable to Rock Island Rotary with a note on the memo line, "Water Project" and given to our treasurer. We will order filters in groups of five each time the account reaches \$1,750.00. So far through the generosity of our members, many partner Rotary clubs, individual Rotarians, Interact, and EarlyAct Clubs in Western Illinois and Eastern lowa we have purchased 240 filters and are providing safe drinking water to over 17,000 children. Unfortunately, the latest data shows 2 billion people in the world live without access to safe water and 1.7 billion lack basic sanitation. Over 800 children under age 5 die every day from diseases linked to unsafe drinking water, poor sanitation or poor hygiene.

OUR CLUB'S FAVORITE "FINN" STRIKES AGAIN!

It is once again March and as eagerly anticipated Kevin Koski made his annual plea for observance of St. Urho's Day noting that Urho is the "Patron Saint of Finland. Kevin recited the legend of St. Urho saying he chased the grasshoppers out of ancient Finland, thus saving the grape crop and the jobs of Finnish vineyard workers. He did this by uttering the phrase: "Heinäsirkka, heinäsirkka, mene täältä hiiteen" (roughly translated: "Grasshopper, grasshopper, go to Hell!"). However according to Wikipedia, the legend of Saint Urho was the invention of a Finnish American named Richard Mattson, who worked at Ketola's Department Store in Virginia, Minnesota in the spring of 1956. The Day is not celebrated in Finland, but does give the Finns in America a chance to "one up" the Irish, celebrating St. Urho's Day the day before St. Patrick's Day. Four Shillings Short



Friends and house guests of Ruth Lee are professionally known as Four Shillings Short, but Ruth knows them as Aodh and Christy. They perform all over the world presenting Celtic and American folk, inspired by Indian Raga and Ethnic idioms; a diverse and inventive Traditional Music Experience. The husband/wife duo of Aodh Og O'Tuama from Cork, Ireland and Christy Martin from California, have been performing together since 1995. They tour in the US and Ireland, are independent folk-artists with 13 recordings, perform 100 concerts a year and live as the Troubadours of old traveling from town to town performing at music festivals, theatres & performing arts centers, folk & historical societies, libraries, museums and schools. Today they performed at the Rock Island Public Library. For those wanting to hear them, you can join Ruth tomorrow at the Cordova Public Library for a noon lunch followed by the concert. Aodg Og O'Tuama: vocals, tin whistles, doumbek, spoons, gemshorn, bowed psaltery, recorders, crumhorn, Native American Flutes, and many others. Born in Cork, Ireland, Aodh Óg (pronounced, ayog) studied Medieval and Renaissance music in college. He received a music fellow-

ship to study at Stanford University in 1983. Played in a group called Drivelling Druids before forming the group Four Shillings Short. Christy Martin: vocals, hammered dulcimer, mandolin, mandola and bouzouki, banjo, North Indian sitar, guitar, charango, bowed psaltery, ukulele and bodhran. She is a multi-instrumentalist and vocalist Christy was born into a musical family. She played the sitar for 10 years, starting at the age of 16. Took up folk music in the '80's. Has been playing hammered dulcimer since 1993. She was formerly in a band called Your Mother Should Know.
