Rev. Laura Mahn **NEST CAFE**

Rev. Laura Evans Mahn the founder of NEST Café which is an acronym for Nourish Everyone Sustainably Together, received her Bachelor's Degree in Speech Communications from the University of

North Carolina – Wilmington, and her Master of Divinity from Candler School of Theology, Emory University. She served five years as PRN Chaplain at Trinity Healthcare supervising volunteers, interns and auxiliary chaplains and providing spiritual care to patients from a variety of cultural and ethnic backgrounds. In 2010 Rev. Mahn joined the staff at Augustana College serving for four years as Vocation Counselor and Volunteer Coordinator. In 2015 she accepted the pastor position at First Christian Church, Princeton, Illinois, commuting from her home in Rock Island where she resides with her husband, 2 sons, and 2 dogs. CAFÉ and became Chairman of the Board in 2020 and has served as Executive Director since 2021. The pay-what-you-can establishment served healthy meals to those in need at monthly pop-up sites for the their first two years. In April 2022, the cafe opened its doors at a permanent location on 4th Avenue in Rock Island, where they provide affordable, nutrient-based meals to the community. Rev. Mahn's hope is that NEST CAFÉ will help break the cycle of food insecurity and create more volunteer opportunities in the Quad Cities area. NEST isn't a soup kitchen. It's a real restaurant, just with a different payment system. Nutritious food is served buffet-style, and its menu will change daily to highlight seasonal foods and produce from local vendors. Laura stated, "When people are food insecure they try to make their money stretch as far as possible. They get food that is high in calories and high in sugar and highly processed. We want to be a place to help break that cycle." Guests are encouraged to pay a suggested donation for either a half plate or full plate, but any amount is welcome. Guests can donate less or donate more, whatever their situation allows them to donate, They also believe that everyone has something of value to give. So, if a guest doesn't have money, and is willing, they may become part of NEST Cafe in other ways such as donating time volunteering at the restaurant. Opening in Rock Island was an intentional choice. "We're the most diverse city in the Quad Cities. We also have the highest rate of food insecure people," Laura stressed the different approach taken by NEST Café from typical soup kitchens and food pantries. She said the traditional settings do good work in providing a quantity of food to those in need, but the food is often highly processed and the quality in terms of healthful nourishment is limited. Plus, she noted those behind the counters in traditional settings may get a great deal of satisfaction from helping others, but those on the receiving side of the line often feel shame and a loss of dignity. Some in need may not come because they don't want to admit they need help. NEST treats everyone as a restaurant customer. They order what they want and "donate" what they can. NEST provides a "suggested donation" for meals, but encourage those that can pay more to do so and those who can pay less or nothing to do that as well. No one knows what other customers are paying. They have found that 50-70% donate the suggested amounts or more and 30-40% donate less or nothing. She said the suggested donation does not cover the cost of the meal because it is purposely kept low to not intimate anyone from eating. The difference is made up by those that donate more than the suggested donation, grants, and private donations. After 1 year in their permanent site which will be completed this week, she says NEST Café is doing fine. They are expanding to two entrees, two side dishes, and two desserts each day. The menu changes daily and the restaurant is open for lunch from 11am to 2pm Tuesday through Saturday and for dinner from 5pm to 8pm Thursdays. They post each week's menu on their website, www.nestcafeqc.org. NEST accepts donations of fresh produce, cash, and volunteer time. Ms. Mahn said they need 3-4 volunteers each day they are open. NEST Café serves an average of 50 customers daily, but daily customers vary widely. In two days, last week they had 130 one day and 27 the next. Their goal for 2023 is 10,000 meals and Laura said she is very confident they will achieve and pass that number. We thank Laura for a great presentation!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

RI's Month of Water & Sanitation

Nothing says confidence like a strong feeling of self-worth; and in this month celebrating women, Foundation Minute picks up the story of young girls in poverty-stricken parts of the world whose sense of dignity and self-pride is often hurt by very poor hygiene and sanitation.

The District Stewardship Subcommittee of the Rotary Club of Rajapalayam Kings City (RID 3212, India) recently boosted the morale of female students at a government school by donating a girls toilet block, along with other facilities with a Global Grant aided by TRF. In an online publication in the latest edition of Rotary, the N A Annappa Raja Memorial High School is the beneficiary of a modern toilet block for girls, a Reverse Osmosis plant, two interactive boards with touch screen, a wi-fi link, a gym and a range of sports equipment and musical instruments; all set up at the cost of R48.57 lakh (USD 59,987.59). The GG project was initiated during the tenure of PDG P N B ¬Murugadoss (2020–21) "when our charter president John Selvaraj got a request from school headmaster A Ramesh for a new sanitation block to replace the dilapidated toilet which the girls found embarrassing to use," he says.

Every three months, the club's grants committee will be visit N A Annappa Raja Memorial HS School to inspect the Rotary facilities. A student expresses gratitude for the new toilet block because it is "posh and neat; and the washbasins help us clean our hands easily during lunch. Now I enjoy attending school." Headmaster Ramesh is confident of enrolling more girls with the new toilets. There are 820 boys, 630 girls in this school. Club president B Kumar Raja is happy that "we have done a GG project at a deserving school with students whose parents are mostly working in textile mills and factories."

Rotary Club Fargo Moorhead (RID5586) is the global partner for this Water and Sanitation project. Foundation Minute wishes TRF's newest awardee bon voyage and much success in her studies!

WE'RE ON THE "GROW"

According to a Rotary International report as of March 26, 2023, thirteen Rotary clubs in District 6420 have gained 63 members resulting in a net increase in membership in each of these clubs since the 2021-22 Rotary year. In other words, to date, these clubs have gained enough new members this year to make up for any losses in membership last year. The District recently sent a message to our President Cindi Gramenz recognizing and celebrating the good work of these clubs. Dixon, Geneseo, Illinois Valley Sunrise and Loves Park all have a net gain of one member. Belvidere, Kishwaukee Sunrise, Oregon, and the Quad Cities Club all have a net gain of two members. That is no small task considering that last year was still a pandemic year.

There are still three months left in this Rotary year. We know there are still many great men and women in our community that we know, work with, and are friends of, that would be outstanding Rotarians. 
