the new and first full time Executive Director. Sara, along with her husband Dylan, is a native to Moline. She graduated from Moline High School in 2008 where she accepted a full tennis scholarship to Northern Illinois University. Upon graduation in 2012, she accepted a graduate assistant position where she coached at Northern while perusing her Masters in Sport Management and went on to graduate in 2012. "Sara says she is thrilled to continue her work with youth development and was especially excited to become the first Executive Director of the First Tee. Today Sara along with Decker Ploehn, Bettendorf City Administrator, and Clair Peterson, recently retired Director of the John Deere Classic, both Board First Tee Board members joined us to talk about the new facilities and expanded First Tee programs at Highland Springs Golf Course. Ploehn Board Chairman at the time of Sara's appointment said her background in development with the Boy Scouts of America and her educational background in Sports Management from Northern Illinois University, made her the strongest candidate for the Executive Director position. The First Tee of the Quad Cities is a youth development organization introducing the game of golf and its inherent values to young people. Through after school and in school programs, The First Tee of the Quad Cities helps shape the lives of young people from all walks of life by reinforcing values like integrity, respect, and perseverance through the game of golf. The First Tee of the Quad Cities serves the community with Facilities at Red Hawk Golf Course in Davenport, Highland Springs Golf Course in Rock Island, Emeis Golf Course in Davenport, and in 2024 will open their first indoor year-around facility at Iron Tee in Bettendorf. Red Hawk was the first site for First Tee and currenlty serves 430 each year with 26 six-week sessions. Rock Island's Highland Springs was the second First Tee location which currently serves 208 kids. Emeis was the most recent addition and it is alreadying serving 210 kids with 24 six-week sessions. Sara was most excited about the new Club House built as a joint project between the City of Rock Island and First Tee. That facility just opened and features a dedicated First Tee classroom. First Tee also has special programs with the M.L. King Center, Boys and Girls Clubs, the Moline YMCA, In total First Tee serves approximately 800 Quad City area kids. The six-week program costs \$85, however Sara said no child has ever been turned away because of inability to pay. Grants and scholarships are avaiable. In addition to their regular teaching of golf skill along with important life lessons, First Tee also is the chief sponsor of the John Deere Classis Youth Day which annually attracts over 1,000 kids who enjoy numerous activities at the TPC Golf Course includin learning from PGA professional, hitting balls, and having a great time on the golf course. First Tee also hosts a "Breakfast of Champions" where kids get close contact with some of the younger Corporate exemption players. First Tee also fields a PGA Jr. Team sponsored by TPC and those kids get to compete with others from all over the state and region. They also send one First Tee student each year to a 4-day PGA Jr. Academy for an experience of a lifetime working with pro coaches. This past week they also were able to take 10 girls to the NAIA Women's Collegiate National Championship Tournament held at Deere Run and those kids got to play with and learn from the Collegiate golf stars. Thanks to Sara for an exciting and informative program! Continued Success!

Rotary's Youth Service Month

The news this week is culled from the latest message to Rotarians by the RI Trustee Chair 2022-23, Ian H.S. Riseley, published in the current edition of ROTARY (May 2023). His message is a reminder of what it takes to make lives better in communities around the world.

"Do all the good you can, to all the people you can, in all the ways you can, as long as ever you can."

While we don't know its exact origin, this widely quoted saying summarizes what Rotary and The Rotary Foundation are all about: We do quite a lot of good, serving people around the world in myriad ways, and we are in it for the long haul.

How many other charities do so much good in so many ways for so many as The Rotary Foundation?

Not only do we, the volunteers, fund most of our projects, but we often contribute significant volunteer hours in organizing and executing them. The "regional offices" of our charity — also known as Rotary and Rotaract clubs — are our reliable go-to partners in the more than 200 countries and geographical areas in which we operate. And when we lack expertise in an area, we partner with outside organizations whose trust we have earned, such as the World Health Organization, to deliver results on the ground that truly change lives....We in Rotary are excellent stewards of our grants, with most of the funds going toward humanitarian support itself and relatively little going to grant administration costs. This is why Charity Navigator has consistently given its highest rating to The Rotary Foundation, year after year....Unlike some charitable organizations, we don't take the "parachute approach" to humanitarian work. Before we lift a shovel to start any Foundation project, we conduct community needs assessments and work closely with members of the community. The Foundation also acts quickly when needed, such as through our disaster response grants, as we did with the recent earthquake in Turkey and Syria."




President Cindi made her donation and Challenges each of us to match it (or at least donate something, more or less!
