Darren Hart is known locally as a long-time local police offcer and more recently as the Rock Island

County Sheriff. What many don't know is he serves and has important responsibilities as the Rock Island County Emergency Management Agency Director. That Agency is charged with vast responsibility. Mr Hart is a 26 year veteran of the Rock Island County Sheriff's Department and prior to that served as a city of Rock Island policeman. Emergency management today is a coordinated partnership involving local, state, and federal agencies as well as volunteer organizations and the business community. Within an integrated emergency management framework, these various entities assist their communities to prepare

management structure that exists in the United States today has its roots in the civil defense efforts that arose during World War II in response to the possibility of an attack on the homeland. In the early 1951 Congress and President Turman formally created the Federal Civil Defense Administration with the prime task to provide the leadership and the planning and the impetus for a national system of civil defense which was manned by the States and cities. In the 1960s, the field of emergency management began expanding from defense planning in case of attack to the 1980s the when focus had widened to the multi-hazard approach that prevails today. The Agency plans, practices, and is ready to supervise emergencies in the Rock Island County from floods to air disasters, severe storms and industrial/chemical hazzard situations. Terrorist attacks on prime targets in our county such as the atomic power plant and 3M's chemical plant. They are ready with preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation information for county businesses, schools, and care facilities. Mr. Hart stated that the County EMA regularly drills on responding to each of these types of disasters. The agency supervises the local response to natural disasters such as the recent tornados and the duracio. Health crisis as they did during the Covid pandemic handling security for all the vaccines in the area and bringing in household supplies when shortages occurred in local supermarkets including even a semi-load of dog food. The EMA also distributed thousands of face masks, hand sanitizers, and face shields. They also plan and prepare for airport power plant, and hazzardous chemical and waster disasters. Director Hart stressed that the County EMA works hand-in-hand with the local cities and villages and has a strong working relationship with emergency agencies and planning on the Iowa side. He holds weekly meetings with all the police chiefs in the county to stay abreast of their needs and make them award of issues and information received in his office. Since safety and security are closely related to both emergency planning and policing, Mr. Hart who is the elected Sheriff of Rock Island County also provided intersting information regarding the sheriff's department. Hart stated that his office has 186 employees which includes 65 officers, with over 40 having duties patrolling the county. 55 are correctional officers providing security in the county iail. 12 are communication specialists staffing the county's 911 emergency system. 12 work in maintenance, and 31 serve as court baliffs. The office is charged with providing security for the court complex and all country offices. He stated that the county jail has a capacity of over 300 and is currently housing 219 prisoners. Among the prisoners are 15 from other jurisdictions that pay Rock Island County for housing their "overload" prisoners. Last year Hart said, Rock Island County brought in \$2 millnion in fees for housing prisoners from other jurisdictions. Darren was very proud that the Rock Isalnd Sheriff's office is recognized as the most diverse sheriff's department in Illinois. The populaiton his office serves is 30% non-white and his sheriff's department staff is 27% non white. He also noted that Rock Island county covers 451 square miles but because of it's shape requires traveling 71 miles to go from one end to the other. We thank Sheriff/Director Hart for a highly informative presentation!

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 2 of RI's Month of Membership & Extension.

In honor of the on-going FIFA Women's World Cup in Australia and New Zealand, the news this week is about a brand-new Rotary Foundation Grant approved by the Trustee of TRF. According to an online report, "The Rotary Foundation has just introduced a new kind of grant for deployment in Australia and Brazil — Corporate Social Responsibility Grants, or CSR Grants.

The goal is to attract financial backing for Rotary projects from for-profit organizations. CSR Grants is a standalone program of The Rotary Foundation (the "Foundation") and its associate foundations intended to help for-profit corporations achieve their social responsibility goals. Projects funded through CSR Grants will be implemented by host clubs or districts, with funds contributed by corporations. The corporate contribution must be paid to the Foundation or the local associate foundation to fund the grant. Currently, CSR Grants is available only to for-profit corporations incorporated in Australia or Brazil. A similar program is available in India, subject to separate Terms and Conditions. The Foundation may modify the terms and conditions of CSR Grants at any time to clarify them or to reflect policy changes. CSR Grants combine the simplicity of a District Grant and the scale of a Global Grant. The minimum contribution from the corporate is \$35,000 (Aust.) and there is no upper limit in the value of the gift. The corporate's contribution can also be supplemented by cash from clubs and other sources. In Australia, the CSR program is being run by the Foundation's local arm, Rotary Foundation Australia (RFA).


SILENT AUCTION ITEMS NEEDED



In accepting the District Rotarian of the Year Award, Ms. Gramenz credited Rock Island Rotary members for the Rock Island Club 3093's success.
