

pollinators. The Amôwa Forest Preserve offers approximately 179 acres of protected land for visitors to explore and habitat for species that are in rapid decline due to loss of quality habitat. Quality habitat loss is a significant contributing factor for the decline of pollinators like the endangered Rusty Patched Bumblebee and vulnerable American Bumblebee Amôwa does not allow off-road motorized vehicles, horses, drones, aircraft or remote-controlled items, fires or fireworks, and dogs must be on a leash at all times. Permitted activities include hiking, bird watching, and wildlife viewing. Going back a few years, Petersen stated that up until 2016 Illiniwek Preserve had 65 acres along the Mississippi that was just mowed grass. It wasn't being used and served no real purpose. He proposed that it be returned to native prairie with native grasses and flowering plants to create a habitat for all sorts of insects, birds, and wildlife. With the help of Rotarian and Country Board member Kai Swanson, Ranger Peterson received permission from the Forest Preserve Commission and started the conversion. Over five years starting in 2017, 25 acres of mowed grass was removed and replanted with prairie grasses and plants. Another 10 acres was planted with hickory and oak trees reestablishing the native forestry. Petersen noted that it takes three to four years for a prairie to be established with plants and animals. However, in 2019 in the newly established prairie field a Rusty Patch Bumblebee was discovered. They are extremely rare and on the endangered species list. Petersen said that they are no longer found on 98% of what was their native habitat. Illiniwek is now an important part of the 2% of habitat where they remain and after genetic testing it was established that the Illiniwek Rusty Patch Bumblebee is strong, health, thriving, and most importantly mating and expanding the population. In addition to the prairie, Illiniwek also has 100 acres of forest that was extensively filled with invasive undergrowth including lots of honeysuckle trees. Peterson's staff has been working hard clearing out the undergrowth so that wildlife can return to the preferred habitat. To determine what was in the forest bat monitors were placed that can hear the calls for bat species that are inaudible to humans. That study revealed that two more endangered species were inhabiting Illiniwek and could be identified by their calls. The Indiana bat and the Northern Long Eared bat were both identified. Not long after that discover the American Bumblebee was also discovered in the preserve, the fourth endangered species creature found to date in our County's preserve.

Welcome Back to D6000 Flight-to-End Polio Pilots!

Rotarians Peter Teahen and John Ockenfels flew out of the Eastern Iowa Airport in Cedar Rapids on May 5 in a Cessna T210M airplane intent on raising awareness for polio eradication all over the world. They achieved this goal in their 90-day and over 25,000- mile flight. Along the way, they met both fellow Rotarians and complete strangers in several countries, who were impressed by the humanitarian passion of these devoted pilots. Teahen and Ockenfels educated their listeners about the highly infectious disease, which is spread from person to person, through contaminated water and notoriously victimizing children under five. Their audiences also learned how the virus attacks the victim's nervous system, often leading to permanent paralysis. The flight around the world has garnered many funds for TRF because 100% of every donation to Teahen and Ockenfels' Flight to End Polio campaign goes to TRF's Polio Plus Program. By the end of July when the duo returned home, more than \$1,000,000 has been raised for The Rotary Foundation. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will match every donation 2:1.

These two Rotarians sure make other members think of how to contribute to TRF.

Ranger Petersen then told of a 180-acre tract of land near Illiniwek that had been for sale for quite some time. It is located in the northwest portion of the intersection of Route 92 (I-88) intersects with I-80 on Hubbard Road, East Moline. He sought grants and found adequate funding for the county to purchase the tract and in 2022 the newly purchased land became the County's Amōwa Preserve, the newest Rock Island County Preserve. The 180-acre preserve received its name just last year after County officials consulted with the Sauk Nation in Oklahoma. The name was chosen because "Amōwa" means "bee" in Sauk and the area is envisioned as another potential habitat for endangered bee species. Petersen views this area as a conservation corridor to I-80. There are no plans to develop the area for camping or group picnicking. They hope to keep it a natural forest/prairie site with two to three miles of hiking trails. Ranger Petersen said there are many other endangered species that need their native habitat to survive. Approximately 25 acres of the preserve have seen cleared and returned to prairieland. Some rare plant species have already been discovered in Amōwa Preserve. The staff is working to clear undergrowth and honeysuckle and make the forest more habitable for numerous species of wildlife.

Turning to improvements made to Illiniwek Preserve Peterson noted that a grant of over \$280,000 was received to upgrade the main road and bicycle path that goes through Illiniwek. The two had shared the old road and with the great increase in camping and picnicking at Illiniwek, the mix of car, camper, and bike traffic created a safety issue. Using the grant, the road was replaced, and a separate bike path created. Remaining work in the project is construction of a public restroom building which will be underway very soon.

In questions after his presentation, Petersen was asked if he had any tips for homeowners interested in improving their lawns and gardens. He urged used of native plants saying that wildlife evolved along with plant life and species seek out and return their native habitat. Flowering plants of all forms are attractive to the eye but serve little other purpose. Native flowering plants however are just as attractive and provide habitat for bees, butterflies, and other insects that then attract birds and other wildlife species. When asked about future plans and desires for the Forest Preserve, Petersen said he has always hoped for and education center or program but said that is very time consuming and probably will require another full-time person. Currently it is just a long-term hope. He thought it might be accomplished by partnering with other interested environmental organizations.

We thank Ranger Petersen for his entertaining, interesting, and informative presentation! We also urge our members to take advantage of the resources afforded to us in Rock Island county and visit, picnic, or camp at Illiniwek and hike the trails of Amōwa.
