

July 4, 1905, making it the 2nd oldest in the country, behind the West Point Museum. The RI Arsenal Museum began with a letter and 15 boxes of stuff sent to the Arsenal. The Arsenal had numerous displays featured at the 1904 World's Fair and Exposition in St. Louis. Those artifacts were bundled up and sent back to the Arsenal Museum for display, including a taxidermy horse. At the beginning of the 20th Century, the Arsenal was the top producer of leather goods in the world, which is why it needed life-size horses to fit saddles and harnesses. Other interesting artifacts in the collection: Models of the Col. Davenport House and of the original Fort Armstrong. Over the years the museum has undergone extensive renovations. The Museum was closed during WWI and WWII to make room for munition production. It reopened in 1948 and was rebranded in 1950 as the John M. Browning Memorial Institution (interestingly, John M Browning has never visited Arsenal Island. It was rebranded again in 1980 and reverted to the Rock Island Arsenal Museum and focused on: History of the Island, Commands, People, products, and processes of the RI Arsenal - a smaller, but more focused scope. There used to be 1,224 guns on display, but not all were produced on the Island. They now display fewer guns, but all the guns on display reflect the mission of the museum and the local ties. The museum closed again in 2020 because of COVID, and during that time, underwent a complete renovation - the first in 80 years. They are very proud of their installations that show how they made things on the island. Mr. Allie said, the RI Arsenal is where the Army develops things and problem solves. They never really made things in bulk, and that their biggest export was expertise. Many of the workers were sent to one of 150+ private companies during WWII to make the items developed on Arsenal Island in bulk John Deere was one such company that produced armaments during the War. Mr. Allie closed with the saying that the Rock Island Arsenal Museum is the Front Porch to the public to learn this history. Visit the Museum's webpage https://arsenalhistoricalsociety.org/ for details on how you and your family can visit the museum. Admission is Free! They are open Tuesday – Saturday 10AM – 4PM/ Rotary thanks Patrick for an outstanding and very informative presentation.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION MINUTE

Week 4 of RI's Month of Membership & Extension

We hear the news, or watch the disasters as they unfold on TV; or some unlucky ones actually live through...and live to relay it. There is no denying the increasing evidence of something awry with the planet's climate. Three successive heatwaves culminated in deadly wildfires in Greece; massive floodings killed over 1000 and left millions homeless in Pakistan; heavy rains and landslides killed almost 50 in Korea and more than 10,000 homeless.

Close to home in Hawaii, hundreds are dead and thousands missing following devastating wildfires in Maui...the list goes on. Different regions of the globe have been through catastrophes terrible and apocalyptic in their degree of devastation, and as they happen, The Rotary Foundation, through its Disaster Response fund, has been providing relief. The Rotary Disaster Response Fund is launched by TRF to support relief and recovery efforts in areas that have been affected by natural disasters within the past six months.

Rotary Clubs in Greece, Pakistan, and Korea rushed to the aid of fellow human beings by collecting donations to support recovery and provide aid to those affected. Currently, Rotary District 5000 (Hawaii, USA) is collecting monetary donations to support response and recovery efforts. The Rotary Club of Kahala Sunrise, Hawaii, is asking for physical donations for those affected by the wildfires.

The Rotary Foundation added The Environment as its 7th Area of Focus in June 2020. More than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related projects over the past five years.

Your support of the Foundation through our weekly raffle, donations on Foundation Tuesday, donations for Paul Harris Fellow Awards, and your end of the year and IRS required distributions donated to the Rotary International Foundation go directly into the ongoing work and make a huge impact across the globe!
