of Arrowhead Youth Services. Emerick also is a member of the Board of Directors for the Genesis Health Services Foundation, Rock Island Housing Authority, Community Housing Partners, Rock Island County Council on Addiction and New Kingdom Trailriders. Dave has lived in the Quad Cities his entire life (primarily in Rock Island) and has been happily married to Lori for 30 years. They have one daughter, Jordan Marie. They belong to St. Pius X Catholic Church in Rock Island, Illinois. During his leisure time, you will find Dave spending time with his family in their travel trailer exploring points of interest and sightseeing. He also enjoys collecting antiques and trying to get in a round or two of golf. Today was Governor Emerick's "Official Visit" to Rock Island Rotary and his opportunity to lay out his vision for District 6420, recognize the achievements of our Club and District, and present the goals and hopes of new Rotary International President, Gordon R. McInally of Scotland. He began by quoting President McInally who at the Rotary International Assembly in Orlando, Florida, said, "Rotary must capture the World's attention!" McInally then unveiled his presidential logo "Bright & Bold" saying that what Rotary is and what it must be. He followed that up with his Presidential slogan, "Create Hope in the World". Governor Emerick said Rotary must restore hope where there is none and help with recovery from areas of turmoil. Emerick then went through the principal goals of the 2023-23 Rotary Year as set forth by International President McInally. They are 1) Mental Health - noting that more and more people are suffering from mental health issues and yet a stigma remains that creates resistance to seeking help. 2) Promoting Peace – stating that we must continue our humanitarian support for those suffering in areas of conflict and turmoil. 3) Empowerment - by ensuring that past established Rotary initiatives to empower women and girls, and promote inclusiveness and tolerance are continued and continuity maintained. Governor Emerick then turned to Rotary's ongoing campaign to eliminate polio. Once again he said we have polio isolated to just two countries in the world. Pakistan and Afghanistan are the only nations not declared "Polio Free" and the effort in those countries has been stepped up to the point where Emerick said the World Health Organization is considering reducing the time a country must have no reported cases of polio from 3 consecutive years to 1 or 1½ years. That is only possible because of Rotary's huge campaign to provide immunization to the millions of children in those two countries. If that change is made, it is very possible we will see a polio free world in the very near future! Continued page 3

Turning to our District, Governor Emerick noted that in early June he emailed a copy of the District's Strategic Plan to every Rotarian in the district (those that have provided an email address). He said that the District leadership takes the plan very seriously and periodically does a careful review of progress being made toward the goals set out in the plan. He said Membership Goals for this year are a net gain of 10 members district wide. 1 new club chartered, 1 new Rotaract Club, a 10% increase in female membership, and a 10% increase in members 40 years and under. Foundation Goals are a 10% increase in contributions to the International annual fund and a 5% increase in donations to the Polio Plus fund. Goals for **Public Image** include doing a better job of promoting what we do. He noted we don't do it for self promotion, but to attract new members and community support we must make the public award that Rotary is the source of the energy and funding of our programs and projects. The goal for **Service** is to continue an annual District Project, this year's effort to fight hunger and malnutrition by collecting 20lbs of food for every Rotarian in the district. If that goal is achieved Rotarians will have raised and donated 14.4 Tons of food to food pantries and meal sites throughout our District. Finally in the area of Rotary Operations Emerick said the goal is to hold the line as best they can on district dues. He said our District dues have been \$42 per member per year for many years. Because of rising costs there is a possibility of an increase but said if so he believes the increase can be held to no more than \$1 for the year. He also noted that during the Covid pandemic a number of district events and training sessions were not held, and the money usually spent for those events was saved. Those surplus funds are being returned to the clubs in the district via District Grants. An increase of almost \$500 per grant by using surplus funds was approved for 2023-24. Our Club has received District Grants each year for at least the past 4 or 5 years. Concluding, Governor Emerick announced that our District Conference for 2023-24 will be held in Moline, April 26-27, 2024. Thank you Governor for your visit and excellent presentation!

#### SPECIAL RECOGNITION FOR BUD PHILLIS

Governor Emerick added a very special surprise to his visit today by calling forward Dr. Bud Phillis. He praised Bud for his commitment and dedication to Rotary noting the many offices Bud has held and the work he has done both for our club and for District 6420. He said Bud has set an example for all to follow and then presented Bud with a lapel pin signifying **35 years of perfect Rotary attendance!** Bud joined Rotary in 1983 and is now in his 40<sup>th</sup> year of dedicated membership. He has led our Polio Plus Campaign for years and is a polio survivor!

#### ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week 1 of RI's Basic Education & Literacy Month.

As millions of children all over the globe are returning to school for a new academic year, it pays to remember that more than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. That's 17 percent of the world's adult population. The goal of Rotary International is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy. The Rotary Foundation supports education for all children and literacy for children and adults through scholarships, donations, and service projects around the world. Some of the ways TRF is helping improve basic education and literacy all around the world include, among numerous others:

- Opening schools: In Afghanistan, Rotarians opened a girls' school to break the cycle of poverty and social imbalance.
- Teacher Training: Through TRF, Rotarians share their knowledge and experience with educators and other professionals who work with vulnerable populations.
- Teaching adults to read: Rotary members in the United States partnered with ProLiteracy Detroit
  to recruit and train tutors after a study showed that more than half of the local adult population
  was functionally illiterate. Over 500 adults raised their reading levels by three grades during the
  program.
- Making schools healthy: Rotarians are providing clean, fresh water to every public school in Lebanon so students can be healthier and get a better education. So far, at least \$100million has been spent by TRF to get clean water in Lebanese schools.
- In 2021-2022 fiscal year, \$104 Million was spent on Basic Education and Literacy Projects by TRF.


