Kai is a life long resident of Rock Island and joined Rock Island Rotary 2018 as part of the Augustana College Corporate membership team. He has been a very active club member and has loaned his expertise in numerous areas for the benefit of our Club. Kai is special assistant to Augustana College's president, a position he's held since 2005, though he's been on the staff of the college since his Augie graduation in 1986 with a BA degree. His past positions at Augustana include news editor for WVIK-Augustana Public Radio, public relations director for the college, and editor of the Augustana College Magazine. In 2011, he served as interim general manager of WVIK, then in 2014 was interim director of the Augustana Teaching Museum of Art. Kai serves on the Rock Island County Board, is president of the Rock Island County Forest Preserve Commission, and chairs the board of Visit Quad Cities. He is a board member and past chair of the National Association of Presidential Assistants in Higher Education and serves on the Board Professionals Leadership Group of the Association of Governing Boards. Since 1996, he has presented Concert Conversations prior to each Quad City Symphony Orchestra concert, and is the radio voice of the Quad City Symphony on WVIK. Today he shared his expertise in strategic planning to help us as we develop our plan for the coming five years. Kai started by breaking our membership into six groups with each having a strategy taken from our current plan. The strategies were 1) Create a list of local businesses and corporations that do not currently have any members in the Club. Assign a Rotarian to be the liaison for each business to encourage membership. 2) Target diversity [age, race, religion, sex, etc.] when searching for new members. 3) Grow the mentoring program for new members. 4) Create opportunities for young, professionals to grow personally and professionally through Rotary by engaging them as speakers and providing outcomes (examples) of volunteer opportunities. 5) Promote active membership beyond their weekly lunch meeting by having meetups and topical conversations in the community. 6) Growing opportunities for corporate members and ways for corporate members to stay engaged when not attending every week. Kai then asked each group to discuss the strategy and decide has it been accomplished? Should we keep it as is or modify it? Should we remove it as no longer relevant to our club? If we keep it, identify 3 action steps to move this strategy forward. After 15 minutes of discussions each group reported their conclusions. Reporters were Holly Sparkman, Gary Rowe, Kimberly Calhoun, Mark Mayeski, Angela Campbell, and Kathy Trone. Every group felt their assigned strategy should be kept but each also thought some modification was needed. Group one felt that members should be asked first, "Who do you know ..." at various businesses and organizations in the area so that recruiting could be personalized and targeted. Group two felt we have done a respectable job in adding women, some younger, and some racial diversification to our Club but that more needs to be done. They also noted that we should be targeting professionals in Milan since there is no longer a Milan rotary Club. Group 3

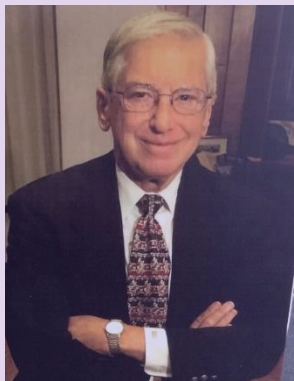

ANOTHER HUGE LOSS FOR ROTARY AND ROCK ISLAND!



Rotarians were saddened to receive the news that our friend and fellow member, Stan Coin, passed away Saturday, October 7, 2023. Funeral services are 10:00 a.m. Saturday, October 14, 2023, at St. George Greek Orthodox Church, Rock Island. Visitation is 4:00 to 7:00 p.m. Friday, October 13, 2023, at Wheelan-Pressly Funeral Home and Crematory, 3030 7th Avenue, Rock Island, where a Trisagion (Prayer) service will be conducted at 6:30 p.m. Burial will be in Rock Island Memorial. Stan joined our club in 1953. His 70 years of membership made him the most senior member of Rock Island Rotary. He served as our president 1994-95 and received our A.T. Peara Award in 1998. Stan chaired and served on numerous Rotary Committees, is a Paul Harris Fellow plus many, and one of our most dedicated and generous members. Stan was 93 and was very proud of his long tenure in our club and his perfect attendance record. Stan had a distinguished career in the food industry and as a founder of the American Bank of Rock Island where he served as president and chairman of the board for more than fifty years. He served on numerous community organization boards and committees and was very active in the St. George Greek Orthodox Church and in his support of Trinity Medical Center. Less than two weeks ago he and bride Kay celebrated their 65th Anniversary.. To say Rock Island Rotary will miss Stan is a substantial understatement. He was a great man and Rotarian.

Group three felt our mentoring program is very important and suggested that mentors be provided with a checklist like new members so they can monitor and encourage new members to take advantage of the various suggested opportunities for becoming an involved member. They also supported the idea of preparing an orientation video for new members. They felt that prospective members should get more information on what Rotary is and what we do before they actually join. Group 4 said much of what previous groups said about bringing in new members applied to their area. They felt we do a pretty good job of providing volunteer opportunities, but need to reach out to make sure newer members are included. Group five believed Rotary gatherings outside our normal meeting are important for getting to know one another better and are particularly important for new members.. They mentioned that in past years we held quarterly social events and suggested we consider doing something similar. Group six stated that they strongly support our corporate membership option and believe it has been of great benefit to the club. They feel that the inability of associate members to have Rotary International accounts and therefore cannot achieve Paul Harris Fellow status makes them feel less than full Rotary members. Kai brought things to a conclusion stating that above all else, "We must be welcoming to People who are not here! President Cindi announced that this was the first of 3 Club Assemblies scheduled to work on our 2024-2029 Strategic Plan. We appreciate Kai's insight and very helpful program!

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to Week ONE of RI's Month of Economic & Community Development.

Southampton Rotary (Ontario, CA), in collaboration with Rotary Hand Up, recently announced that work started earlier in September on a \$54,600 water project in Guatemala. This is being made possible by the receipt of a generous Global Grant of \$34,000 CAD from the Rotary Foundation that the club has been working on for the past 18 months.

The Hand Up Clubs have contributed \$20,600 to this project. As well as writing the grant application and leading the project on behalf of Hand Up, the Rotary Club of Southampton made a direct cash contribution of \$2,000 CAD towards this vital endeavor. Southampton Rotary has closely partnered with the Rotary Club of Huehuetenango in Guatemala to execute this initiative. The project involves the installation of eight rainwater harvesters in the remote highland village of Tuilam, during the fall of 2023. This innovative project will not only provide a supplementary water source for the 490 residents of Tuilam but also alleviate the burden of fetching water from a spring located approximately one kilometer down a steep hill from their village.

Tony Sheard, Chair of the club's International Services Committee, expressed his enthusiasm, saying, "Our club has a proven track record of successfully completing international humanitarian service projects, such as our water and maternity health projects in Cameroon. We are delighted to lead this venture in Guatemala on behalf of Hand Up, and we eagerly anticipate its completion in early 2024."

1. Our Club is hosting the event right here at the Botanical Center. You should support Club activities and projects.
2. Our regular Club meeting on Tuesday, October 24th has been cancelled to encourage members to attend Monday night's Gala.
3. For those that pay for lunch as part of your dues, you will get a \$10 reimbursement toward your Gala tickets to adjust for not having a Tuesday luncheon.
4. There is an incredible program lined up featuring the two Rotarian pilots who flew their small two-seat airplane around the world to raise money and awareness for Rotary's "END POLIO NOW campaign. They will tell of their amazing journey, the numerous heads of state they met, and the outpouring of support and donations they raised to end polio.
5. Ending Polio is Rotary's premier international project. When Rotary

made the commitment to end polio in 1985 there were 350,000 cases in more than 125 countries including the United States. 1,000 children were DYING of polio each day!

Today the entire world with the exception of 2 countries is polio free. Those countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan report a total of 7 cases so far in 2023. Those cases are isolated in one district in Pakistan and one province in Afghanistan. We are closing in on ending the disease for ever! However medical experts tell us if we were to stop now, within 5 years there would be a resurgence of the disease with as many as 200,000-300,000 cases worldwide every year.

Tickets for the event are \$25 each (many of us will receive a \$10 reimbursement). Of that \$17.50 will fund the upscale buffet banquet, and program expenses. \$7.50 of every ticket will be donated to Rotary's End Polio Now campaign. So, it is too much to ask that you attend? Perhaps your spouse or other guest would like to hear the program. **Be a part of ending this dreaded disease!**

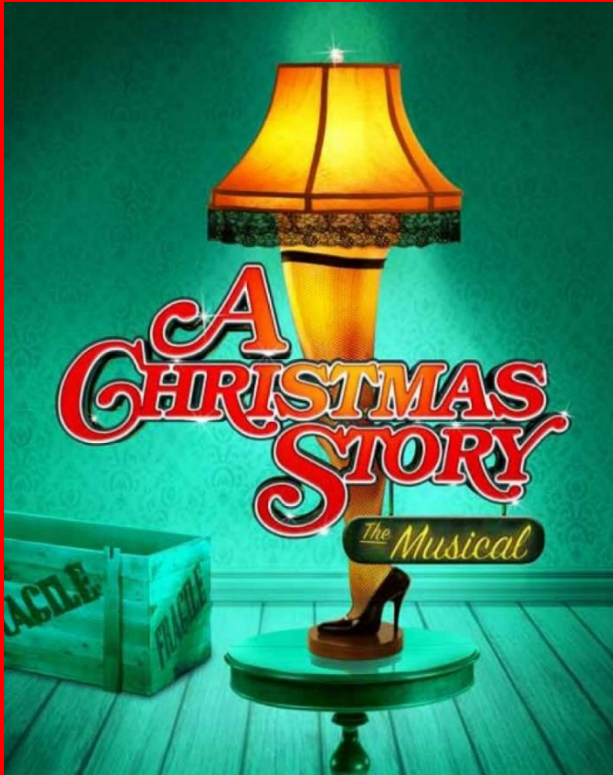
