ThePlace2Be Edwin Salazar

Edwin Salazar is the Youth Director for the YWCA Quad Cities, a position he has held since May of this year. In that position he oversees ThePlace2B, a teen program for at risk youth ages 14-24. ThePlace2B offers a safe place for all teens. Mr. Salazar holds an Associate of Arts degree

in Criminal Justice and Corrections Education from Lincoln Community College and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology from McKendree University. He also has earned a certification of Youth Mental Health First Aid from National Council for Mental Wellbeing. He previously was an Addiction Counselor at Rosecrance Jackson Centers in Moline and worked as a family counnselor at Families First Counseling Services and at Mid-Iowa Family Therapy Clinic Inc. Born and raised in the Ouad Cities, Salazar's background is social work, "My focus has always been advocating for families and young children," said Salazar. At YWCA, Salazar coordinates ThePlace2B, an afterschool program for youth. The goal at ThePlace2B is to provide a safe space for kids, but also a place where they also get a lot of education and opportunities that will benefit them in school and when they start to look for jobs. Salazar's passion for working with young people is obvious. "I feel like I can relate to them," he added. "I'm trying to be the person that I wish my friends and I had to learn from when we were that age." Salazar stated that they have helped 600 youth that were homeless and in danger of trafficking and abuse. He said their clientele are quite diverse and that ThePlace2B is welcoming for all races, relegions, and cultures. Their entire emphasis is on providing a safe place to be and to offer whatever assistance the individual might need. It may be food, clothing, obtaining insurance, housing, getting help with career placement, transportation, medical or dental care or referral services for mental health, and substance abuse assistance. ThePlace2B also provides life readiness skills which includes sponsoring and attending career days, help with resume writing and interviewing, and transportation for work interviews. Leisure activities are also provided including basketball, swimming,

weight room activities, volleyball and other games. ThePlace2B is a substance free / violence free facility. Those with substance abuse issues are not turned away. The emphasis is on getting them help and ending substance use. Those with violent tendencies are counseled and if needed referred to mental health professionals. ThePlace2B has also helped numerous victims of sexual abuse and human trafficking. No matter what the situation they make it know that any youth between 14 and 18 is welcome for dinner every night. Services are provided by the YWCA's Empowerment center for older youth up to 22 years of age. There job skills and GED assistance are provided. That program serves 125 to 150 annually. Mr. Salazar identified four principal goals of ThePlace2B: 1) Identify if you in need (anything from clothing to food, safety to shelter, career training to health care) 2) Meet their Needs.(onsite services or referral) 3) Connect Youth with Services (get appointments and provide transportation if needed to and from needed services) 4) Ensure Youth have the skills needed to complete applications, attend workfairs, operate equipment, and obtain a career. Mr. Salaza has partnered with area schools and hopes to be a resource that give youth an alternative to absenteeism, suspension, and expulsion. We greatly appreciated Edwin's presentation and thank him for speaking with up and for his hard work providing important services for youth in our community.

FOUNDATION RAFFLE






