## How to Improve Students'Academic Performance

Yolanda Grandberry-Pugh, EdD

Yolanda Grandberry-Pugh is an experienced English instructor with 21 years of teaching students in grades 7-12. Learning environments have varied from urban, inner city, and multicultural.

She has created curriculum that engages students and enhances retention. As an Education clinician, Dr. Grandberry-Pugh focus on improving students' reading skills, effective classroom management, and educating students of different backgrounds. Professionally she participated in the Raising Student Academic Achievement Conference, Connection Conference hosted by Illinois State University, the International Society for Key Women Educators, and the International Honor Society in Education. Yolanda joined Rock Island Rotary in 2022. She is an active member in our community holding memberships in DKG - Mu Chapter, NAACP Rock Island Branch #3268, and Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority. She received her BA Degree from Illinois State University in English Education and a Master's Degree in Leadership and Policy Studies from the University of Memphis. She earned her Education Specialist, Leadership in Educational Leadership Certification from Capella University and her Doctor of Education (EdD) in K-12 Leadership and Administration from Western Illinois University. Yolanda began stating that her research began as a study of ways to close the achievement gap between African American and Caucasian students in American schools. After completing her research she indicated that her findings and recommendations applied to all students regardless of race or ethnicity. She then noted that African American students have a higher drop out rate, lower test scores, and a lower graduation rate than their caucasion counterparts. Her research determined that the three most important factors in student's academic performance was their community, their home, and their peers. She also pointed out that these factors proved true across all races and that by far the most important factor is the home. Looking first at the community, Dr. Grandberry-Pugh said that a community that provides encouragement for achievement, and support for schools and education in local churches, financial scholarship opportunies as incentives, recognition for good performance, mentors for those needing help and dropout prevention programs in their schools have the greatest positive influence on

improved academic performance. Turning to the influence of the student's home, Yolanda found that encouragement to do well in the home and parental involvement in the student's education and school extremely important. Recognition for good performance and interest in the student's study habits and homework by those in the home also is a critical factor. Her research and personal experience found that parents are often involved in the child's elementary years, but tend to drift away as the child moves into high school. There the students are often "on their own". Finally in looking at peer influence, Dr. Grandberry-Pugh acknowledged that peer pressure is an extremely critical factor in academic achievement. A student with peers to study with and reinforcement by peers and openess in sharing thoughts and questions is healthy and valuable. Poorly performing students often become loners and quiet in class.

Yolanda stressed that students need to feel good about themselves to perform well in the classroom. She said they need confirmation of their good performance. Dr. Grandberry-Pugh then said her research culminated in her making the following recommendations to improve student's academic performance. 1) Communities, peers and most critically the home must promote the importance of education. 2) A strategic plan committee is needed to ensure consistent promotion of education and good performance. A plan should include encouraging parents and other household members to visit the schools and to take an active role in assisting the student's selection of classes. 3) An area dedicated for study should be created for the student. In homes unable to provide such an area, students should be shown and encouraged to find alternate study areas such as local libraries. 4) Parents need to take an active role in their child's selection of peers to ensure they are surrounded by friends who will provide positive support for education and good performance. 5) Parents need to encourage students to think and speak and try to eliminate any fear in their child of answering incorrectly. Encouraging students to share their thoughts and developing a willingness to work with others is a positive influence toward good performance. Schools need to teach students to work together and recognize that a student who is withdrawing may be an indication of fear of making an incorrect answer, peer ridicule. 6) High schools need to reconnect with colleges and colleges need to reconnect with high schools. Yolanda found there is little communication between the two. Colleges need to let high school educators know what they are looking for in students entering college. That includes discussing what curricula is needed for college success. High school educators need to let colleges know what they are teaching both by state requirements and local initiatives. Working together students can be better prepared to move smoothly from high school to college. Dr. Grandberry-Pugh noted that these are just a few of many recommendations her research led her to make. She offered to share all recommendations with anyone who requests to have them. We thank Yolanda for her presentation and thought-provoking research. We also thank her for her more than two decades of service to students and our community as an educator and role model of education and academic achievement.

#### **ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION MINUTE**

Welcome to Week 2 of RI's Basic Education & Literacy Month

It will be hard to forget the tragedy of September 11. But I will not forget the camaraderie and compassion shown by Rotarians...That was Rotary at its purest. I will remember that for the rest of my life." Walter Parks, New York native and Rotarian, September 11, 2001

This week's "Foundation Minute" is in memory of September 11, 2001, when Rotarians were galvanized into action following the devastating terrorist attacks. From a report by Cary Silver, then editor of The Rotarian, The New York Rotary Foundation raised a total of \$1,499,154 for 9/11 with the help of generous and compassionate Rotarians around the world. Of that money, \$1,226,808 was distributed to victims of the World Trade Center Disaster of 9/11. Rotarians from around the world continued to send letters of support, make contributions, donate blood, and visit the afflicted cities in a spirited show of support. Rotarians from New Zealand, Germany and South Africa offered to pay airfare and host children of victims in their Rotary homes.

Oklahoma City Rotary sent \$100,000 to New York and \$20,000 to the victims in Washington, D.C. Those Rotarians who reside near the disaster areas continue to rebuild their lives and reach out to those in greatest need — the so-called forgotten victims. RI President Richard D. King wrote on 12 September: "These events demonstrate all the more the importance of Rotary's Global Quest to keep our organization growing and thriving. Where Rotary exists in the world, there is a greater chance for peace. By swelling the ranks of Rotarians dedicated to peace, we can further strengthen Rotary's mission to foster international understanding and goodwill."

It has been 22 years since September 11, 2001, and scores of earth-shattering disasters, human-made and natural, have followed; with the latest being the earthquake in Morocco on September 8, 2023, that so far has killed over 2,000 victims. The Rotary Foundation is not resting on its oars as it continues to respond to the needs of victims of terrorism, war, flood, fire, and earthquakes.

#### Some Losses Cannot be Replaced

Rotarians were deeply saddened, and our Club suffered a hard to accept loss when word was received that our fellow member, Mary Fislar, lost her long and difficult battle with severe health issues on Thursday, September 14<sup>th</sup>. At the time of her death Mary was serving as our Membership Chair, was a volunteer Sergeant at Arms Aide, and served on the District 6420 Membership Committee. Mary served as our 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-President 2002-03, 1st Vice-President 2003-04, and Club President for 2004-05. She was a Paul Harris Fellow and honored her husband, Dick Fislar, with Paul Harris Fellow honors. In 2006 Mary received our club's highest honor, the A.T. Peara "Service Above Self" Award. Mary helped with virtually every club project and fundraiser and often enlisted the additional help of hubby, Dick. Behind the scenes Mary frequently offered her talents as a professional travel agent to assist club members in their travels, both for Rotary business and for pleasure. She and Dick, co-owners of Picture Perfect Travel, also provided travel packages prizes for Rotary fundraisers. Above and beyond her dedication and service to Rotary, Mary was a gentle, kind, incredibly sweet, and fun-loving lady. She will be missed by all who knew her and by hundreds more who benefited from her service in Rotary.


