CHRISTIAN CARE



FRANK ROE Executive Director

Frank Roe retired from the United States Navy after serving 25 years on active duty. He has served as the Executive Director of Christian Care since May 2017 overseeing several program upgrades and the acquisition of Martha's House, a shelter for single women and women with

children. He currently is vice-chair of the Rock Island Community Development Commission (CDC) an advisory body that assists the city in development and operation of Community Development Block Grant programs. Frank is a member of the Knights of Columbus, and a former board member of DeLaCerda House, a facility serving those suffering from HVIC/AIDS and homelessness. Mr.

Roe began by stating that Guy Oliver Rogers, a boxer who went years with out a defeat "found Jesus" and opened the Rock Island Rescue Mission in 1916 to help men who were coming home from World War I with no job, no housing, and few prospects. It soon became evident that the men were not alone. They brought wives and families with them, and the mission expanded to provide services, food, and assistance to all. Rogers also held Chapel services every night. Over the next 107 years the Rescue Mission has provided continuous services and has evolved and been renamed "Christian Care". The original mission building is now gone and a new 42 bed shelter for homeless men was built and houses the Christian Care Mission. A few blocks aways a historic home built in 1874, now called "Martha's House", provides a Christian Care 20-bed shelter for women and women with children. Frank stated that during the pandemic many facilities were shrinking and some even closed. Christian Care decided to go the other direction and when the Quad City Haven of Hope, the only women's shelter in the Illinois Quad Cities opted to close, Christian Care negotiated the purchase of the home with a commitment to continue and expand the services previously offered by Haven of Hope. The parties agreed and "Martha's House" was born. In addition to shelter, Christian Care provides 40,000 meals annually to anyone in need. They serve three meals a day, 365 days each year. During the pandemic when public meal sites were ordered closed, Christian Care obtained donations and purchased Styrofoam takeout food boxes and continued providing meals to all who were hungry as a carryout service. For the homeless Christian Care serves between 200-250 men each year and thus far in 2023 has served 100 women and children. Frank stressed that the shelter does not provide and is not intended to provide permanent shelter. The average stay is about 40 days. While in the shelter multiple services are provided including helping the homeless to obtain IDs if they were lost or stolen; getting Social Security cards and benefits; helping obtain disability benefits if the resident qualifies; obtaining SNAP cards and state benefits available for those in need. Services have even included helping immigrants whose papers were lost or stolen to obtain legal documentation and green cards. Beyond the walls of the two shelters, Christian Care also provides Street Outreach services where Christian Care Staff in association with Project Now, spend 40 hours weekly on the streets finding homeless who need help and offering services either in the shelter or for those who don't want to enter the shelter, on the street if that is their preference. Some want help with finding their own housing and Christian Care will provide that help Nothing is forced on anyone, but help is provided if they want it. At the mission the large dining room provides a meal site open to all whether a mission resident or not. They also provide a public shower available to all in need. Behind the mission CC has seven garden beds and annually grows 400-500lbs of produce that is used in the dining room adding nutrition to the meals. See "Christian Care" page 3

Mr. Roe stressed that Christian Care provides the only 7 days a week, 365-day meal site in the area. He also said that approximately 300 of the lunches and/or dinners are served by volunteers. Some are individuals, some are families, and some are organizations. They volunteer to act as servers and some even agree to do the cooking and prepare the entire meal. Frank also gave a quick review of the many other services provided which include Life Skill training, a "Food for Families" program, weekly visits by the Community Health Care Mobile Clinic, an on-site Resource Library, free legal services provided through Prairie State Legal Services, a parish nurse, and continuing the tradition of the original Rescue Mission, Chapel services every night. The annual budget for Christian care is \$822,000 provided through grants, donations, and fund raising. Administrative costs are kept at about 11% with the vast majority of funds going for services. In concluding, Mr. Roe thanked Rock Island Rotary for our support and mentioned that we were a major funder of the public shower that was installed about a year ago, replacing the chairs in the dining room/meal site, recently collecting fruit for use in the meal site. He mentioned that many members of Rotary are Christian Care Donor and several serve on the Christian Care Board of Directors. He also noted that Rotarians have been very supportive of the Christian Care Fundraisers and participate in their annual Trial Night, Have a Heart for the Homeless Luncheon, Pancake Breakfast, and the Frigid Feet walk for the homeless coming up on December 16th. We thank Frank for his detailed update on the many activities and services provided by Christian Care and extend our appreciation for all he, along with our current president, Cindi Gramenz, who serves as Operations Officer of Christian Care, do for our community and some of our most needy and vulnerable citizens.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION MINUTE

Welcome to the Final Week of RI's Month of Economic & Community Development.


Sometimes, it pays to remember the saying: "charity begins at home." This week's Foundation Minute, pulled from <a href="https://clubrunner.blob.core.windows.net/0000050027/en-ca/files/sitepage/the-rotary-foundation/foundation-powerpoint-from-assembly-2023/TR" is a story about a Zone 29 district members, D-6000 and D5970. This story is about using The Rotary Foundation Vocational Training Grant model in a repetitive, efficient, and effective manner and working with other NGOs.

Annually in Brazil, Mexico, Bolivia, Colombia, Argentina, and Ecuador, more than 7700 children born with clubfoot abnormalities will have their conditions corrected and disabilities prevented by orthopedic surgeons trained in the Ponsetto Method by vocational training teams funded by Rotary Foundation Global Grants. Six Global Grants, totaling \$550,000, were sponsored by Rotary clubs in Districts 6000 and 5970 and supported by the Rotary Action Group for Clubfoot, organized by Iowa Rotarians.

The Rotary Club of Ankeny in collaboration with Blessman International, an NGO founded by Iowan Dr. Jim Blessman sponsored a \$200,000 Global Grant to construct 35 non-polluting sanitation facilities in early childhood development centers in disadvantaged rural communities surrounding Polokwane and Mokopane, South Africa. The facilities are providing for basic human dignity by replacing open defectaion and eliminating the horrific danger of drowning in pit latrines for more than 1,000 children. To multiply the benefits of the project and to assure its sustainability, the grant also funded training in the use and maintenance of the facilities for the school staffs and instruction for the children on hand washing to improve hygiene and health.

Rock Island High School INTERACT



Lonnie Behnke agreed to takeover sponsorship of the Rock Island High School Interact Club midway through the 2021-22 school year. The Club had been dormant for at least three years at the time. In a matter of weeks Lonnie had members signed up, Club shirts ordered and handed out, and projects underway. He recruited five Rocky students who attended RYLA in May of 2022. Progress continued in 2022-23 with more members, more projects, four more students for RYLA, and numerous cooperative efforts with our Rotary Club. Today



Lonnie spoke to bring us up to date on the Interact Club. He noted that last year their emphasis was on the environment. The Club took over maintenance of the school gardens and raised a great crop of produce. They donated much of the crop and used part as a fundraiser. Lonnie and the Club made pickles and did canning which they sold as an additional fundraiser. They also took on cleaning and revamping the school greenhouse located on the third floor of Rock Island High School Their efforts allowed the area to be used by staff as a quite and relaxing resting place and a well-equipped facility for caring for plants from classrooms that are brought to the greenhouse during school vacation sessions. With money raised through their fundraisers the Interact Club purchase a Water Filter and became partners in our Water Filter project. Their filter is now providing safe, clean water for rural village children in Kenya. Lonnie then turned to the Interact Club activities in 2023-24. Officers were elected and either have or will be attending our meetings as Jr. Rotarians. Kal Boswell who attended RYLA was elected president. They also elected a vice president and secretary. The Club's focus this year is "Celebrating Rocky Students". In an effort to combat some of the negative information caused by a small minority of the student body, Interact seeks to honor and highlight the 99% of kids who are great students and good young adults in our community. Interact helped create a "Pride Store" and awards pride cards to deserving students that can be used to purchase items including food, makeup, beverages, jewelry, and other items from the Pride Store.. The Club also sponsors a once a month "Fun Friday" offering a free social event open for all students. They have music, food, a tattoo artist (henna ink) and in December will add Karaoke with cocoa and cookies. Their next big project is hosting a Rocky Talent Show slated for rehearsal in January followed by a show with students and staff providing the talent. It is very evident that Rocky Interact is active and growing and in good hands with sponsor, Lonnie Behnke! Thank you!


