




QUAD CITIES INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

He holds a degree in Airport Management from the University of North Dakota and has earned certifications in Airport Security (AAAE) and is an Accredited Airport Executive (AAAE). He is also certified in First Aid, CPR, AED, Airport Operations, and Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting. Goetz is also a licensed.

private pilot. He began his Air industry career as an intern at the Greater Rockford Airport. He then served as an intern at the Grand Forks, ND Regional Airport where he remained for seven years and rose through the ranks to become an Airport Operations Specialist II. He moved to the Port of Bellingham, WA serving for over 6 years and then became Airport Operations Manager for the City of Klamath Falls. OR a position he held for four years prior to accepting the position at Quad Cities International. Ashleigh Davis holds a degree in Organizational Communication and Journalism from North Central College. Prior to her position at Quad Cities Airport, she was an Account Executive with Culloton Strategies, Public Relations Manager for ALDI USA, and Director of Public Relations at Augustana College. She joined the Quad City Airport staff in November of 2019. Mr. Goetz began the presentation telling us about the huge job of keeping the airport open during snowstorms such as we had a few weeks ago. He said the airport has an entire fleet of snowplows, snow sweepers, snow blowers, and runway deicers. Their blowers can tackle 9' deep snow and throw snow up to 200 feet. Their deicer has arms reaching out 100 feet so they can do an entire runway in one pass. He also noted that the airport cannot use salt because it is highly corrosive to airplane aluminum. They must use a special mixture of sodium on all airport runways, taxi, and parking areas. The airport also has a vehicle equipped with braking measurement devices. The drive down the runway, slam on the brakes, and the devices measures the braking distance to stop. That information is critical in determining if the runways are safe for use. The airlines make the actual call on whether flights are cancelled or delayed using information provided by the airport. Pilots make the final decision on whether or not to take off. Mr. Goetz also noted that the airlines have control over all luggage handling and that airport personnel are not allowed to touch luggage. So, if your luggage is lost, don't call the airport, call the airline! Ms. Davis then stepped to the rostrum and spoke about airport services and marketing both to the public and to airline companies. She stated that Allegiant flights to Phoenix-Mesa will be restarting in the spring and continued into at least August. She then provided some very interesting information on the airline industry. During covid flights were shut down and then were restarted but greatly reduced. To offset the huge loss in revenue and to cut ongoing costs the airlines offered many employees early retirement and for senior employees including pilots, incentive packages were offered for retirement. As a result, now that the airlines are gradually gearing up to full service, there is a huge shortage of pilots, mechanics, ground personnel, and flight attendants. During the pandemic airlines also retired many of their less used and/or older aircraft. Regional airports such as the Quad City International were impacted the hardest since they provide service using many of the smaller and older airplanes. She noted that 420 fifty seat planes were retired from service between 2019 and 2023 Early retirement was also offered to airport controllers and there is now a shortage of controllers. These shortages of pilots, mechanics, attendants, ground personnel, controllers and airplanes all result in fewer planes in the air. Therefore, trying to add additional service is extremely difficult. Our airport was very fortunate to recently add service to Charlotte. She noted that Charlotte is one of the largest airport hubs and we are fortunate that Deere and Company has significant travel to the southeast convincing American Airlines that offering that service would be profitable and sustainable. Quad City International has added programs to help combat the shortage of personnel, one being the "Girls in Aviation" program that brings high school aged girls to the airport and shows them opportunities for jobs traditionally not held by girls including positions as airline mechanics and pilots. The hope is to interest young women and get them starting into training programs that will lead to well paying jobs in the airline industry. Ms. Davis also noted that airlines look to regional and community data in deciding where to add and reduce service. We are fortunate that most flights out of the Quad Cities are full, so there is no shortage of demand. Airlines also look at population trends and an area's economic health, so population and economic growth are very important to the future of our airport. She said incentives such as temporarily waiving fees and charges are often offered to attract additional airlines or services. Ms. Davis said that three times a year Air Service Conference are held where she and representatives of all airports attend as do representatives of all the airline companies. Airport representatives request appointments with the airline personnel and if grant, they are given 20 minutes to make a "pitch" for their airport and community. She said it is much like "speed dating" with people moving from table to table. So far it appears she and our airport are holding their own in this competition for airlines and services. Mr. Goetz then returned to the rostrum and talked about the future. Starting this spring a major renovation will begin construction a new luggage handling system and building that will move luggage screening out of the lobby and get it behind the ticket counters. The counters will be redone as will the brown brick floor in the older portion of the terminal. The cost will be \$18 million. With a total of \$40-60 million scheduled for the next five to ten years. renovations and improvements will include new airline offices, a cyanope over the inside lane of the drive along the terminal, and a substantial redecoration of the current terminal from the ticket counter area back to the current FTA security area that leads up the ramp to the boarding area. This was a very interesting and highly informative presentation, and we thank Joe and Ashleigh for their time and expertise.

JOHN PHILLIPS PROVIDES UPDATE ON OUR CLUB FOUNDATION

John began by reminding all that we have <u>TWO</u> Foundations. The Rotary International Foundation that funds projects internationally and in our District (this is where Paul Harris Fellow donations go), and our Rock Island Rotary Club Foundation that funds local projects the benefit Rock Island and its citizens. The Club Foundation provides one large grant annually, typically \$10,000 or more. This is in contrast to our Community Grants Committee which doles out multiple grants up to \$1,500 each year to various non-profits projects throughout the Quad Cities. John noted that the Club Foundation began with a generous \$200,000 bequest from the estate of Rotarian Stan Harris Ongoing funding is provided by our Birdies for Charity drive which added well over \$6,000 dollars last year and individual member donations that added over \$10,000 last year. Many Rotarians give regularly, some designate all or a portion of their required IRA annual distribution go to the Club Foundation. Often memorials for Rotarians are directed to the Club Foundation as are our weekly raffle winnings. John stated that at the end of 2023 our Foundation had assets of \$498,000 and that last week the addition of \$20,000 to establish the Mary Fislar Service Above Self Scholarship the Foundation is now over half a million in assets. John stated that the fund is held at the American Bank & Trust and is administered by a committee of Rotarian Trustees. Each year approximately 3% of the assets (typically more than covered by income earned on the assets) is released for the annual Foundation Grant. 

The Women of Influence Awards was launched in 2005 in the Cedar Rapids/Iowa City Corridor by the QCBJ's 20-year-old sister publication, the Corridor Business Journal. John Lohman, CEO, and president of Corridor Media Group, which owns both business journals, obtained the rights to the Quad Cities awards program, formerly known as the Athena Awards from Women League Change effective in 2024. As a result, 10 women will be honored annually as QCBJ Women of Influence, as well as one Emerging Woman of Influence (age 35 or younger). It recognizes women who are poised to take on larger community-wide roles in the years to come.

The women we're looking for have led nonprofits, held C-suite positions at Fortune 500 companies, presided over courtrooms, taught the next generation through higher education, and contributed to the community in many other impressive ways.

ROTARY FOUNDATION MINUTE

At the end of a week-long Rotary International Assembly, (January 7 - 11, 2024) the United Nations and Rotary International signed an agreement on one of TRF's 7 Areas of Focus: the Environment. According to an online report, "the new partnership between the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) and one of the world's largest service organizations, Rotary International, will work to conserve and restore freshwater bodies.

The partnership with Rotary International will assist UNEP's global efforts to support countries in monitoring, protecting, restoring, and better managing their freshwater ecosystems, such as lakes, rivers, wetlands, and groundwater aquifers, to meet sustainable development, climate, biodiversity, and other global commitments. "Great partnerships are key to accelerating water action," said Leticia Carvalho, Principal Coordinator of UNEP's Marine and Freshwater Branch. "We very much look forward to working with Rotary with its global reach, close connections to communities and action-focused engagement."

With more than US\$23 million invested by Rotary International's foundation, Rotary clubs worldwide undertake impactful environmental projects ranging from local clean-ups and tree plantings to large-scale efforts like installing solar power, creating waste management systems, and conserving ecosystems.

Rotarian Yolanda Grandberry-Pugh is a member of the staff at Rock Island High School and serves as co-sponsor of the African American Heritage Club. This year the Club is celebrating the contributions made by African Americans to the Fine Arts in America. Their Black History Program will take place February 26, 2024, and will feature a timeline of African American music from the spirituals to the music of today. Members of the club are planning a fieldtrip in the spring to Nashville where they will visit several "Historically Black Colleges and Universities" including Fisk University, Tennessee State University, and MeHarry Medical College. They will also visit the National Museum of African American Music.

To raise funds for the trip the students are selling long and short sleeved tee shirts, sweatshirts, and hoodies...
