five years and worked as a Media Relations & Content Developer for TAG Communications. She was honored by the Quad city Business Journal as among the "40 Under 40" young professionals who are making a difference in the Quad Cities region and serves as Board Chair of Hand in Hand. In her "spare time" she coaches soccer, basketball, and various other activities for her kids. Heather holds a Bachelor of Arts in Public Relations/Marketing Communications from St. Ambrose University and a Master of Arts in Management and Organizational Leadership from St. Ambrose. In a very impressive presentation supplemented with photos and videos, Heather noted that the Forestry and Construction Division is the "Little brother" to John Deere Agriculture Equipment Division. Little is a bit relative, since the Construction Division has 3 plants exclusively dedicated to manufacturing construction equipment. Two in Iowa (Davenport and Dubuque) and 1 in North Carolina (Kernersville). Their construction equipment sells worldwide in the United States, Canada, Latin America, Brazil, Africa, Australia, and parts of Europe. However, being the smaller division, all marketing and publications for the division come out of Moline. Heather said if it concerns construction or forestry and has pictures in it or words on it, it came through her or her team of 20. They create all advertising, equipment manuals, and marketing materials for the division. Deere makes eleven construction machine "types" and each type have various models and size available. Her team also creates and monitors all social media for the division.

and develops targeted advertising for the various customer groups they seek to reach. She then gave as a good understanding of all that is involved by show up what her team put together for the recent Con Expo held in Las Vegas. She said the expo is held once every 3 years. At the 2023 Expo Deere's Constriction Division reserved an area equivalent to near 3 football fields on which they displayed over 80 machines, built a two-story main building complete with a Deere Store, meeting/dining rooms, and a display area They served thousands of lunches each of the five days of the Expo. They also built three smaller budlings as part of their display. On top of the two-story building, they added two huge 3-D video boards that were the talk of the town. Grants cannot promote a particular political or religious viewpoint, provide continuous funding (one and done); cannot include fundraising or require people to work without pay, and can't purchase land or a building or be for beautification only.
