the opportunity to develop professional portfolios. His experience in strategic web communication is highlighted by his long tenure as program chair for HighEdWeb, a prominent conference for web development in higher education. Doug is also very active in local and national professional organizations and encourages students to explore this as a professional development opportunity. He serves as a long-standing board member for the Quad Cities Public Relations Network and served as executive director of the Genesius Guild, a classic theatre company from 2006-2021. In 2024 he returned as Executive director and handles fundraising and the areas and the business management of the Guild maintaining federal and state nonprofit filings and working with the city of Rock Island. He is also the spokesperson for Genesius Guildin the community. Mr. Tschopp earned his BA at the University of Pittsburgh and his master's in business administration from Iowa. Mr. Tschopp has been involved in the Guild for over 27 years and spoke about the Genesius Guild today. Rock Island's Genesius Guild is unique in the United States, perhaps in the world. It is, first and foremost, a community theatre serving the Quad Cities and drawing its actors and audience from eastern lowa and northwestern Illinois. Since its founding in 1956, the Guild has performed on indoor and outdoor stages, in television and cinema (an Academy Award winner), in the Quad Cities and at sites as far away as Chicago. They draw audiences from a wide area of the Midwest to enjoy the unusual and accessible summer program of classic theatre. The Genesius Guild's opera series (since 1972) was the cornerstone on which the Quad City Mozart Festival was built. What makes the Guild's summer program unique is its diversity and operation. It is free, open-air (on an outdoor stage in Lincoln Park in Rock Island, open to any area resident who wishes to participate devoted to a range of productions most unusual for a community theatre including Greek tragedy in mask, Shakespearean comedies and tragedies, and Greek comedy in contemporary re-writes. Nowhere else in the country can one find such a mix of free, classical productions: works designed to give our citizens, especially our youngsters, an easy acquaintance with the classics. The Genesius Guild has long been pointed out as an ideal in community arts, but no other area has been able to sustain a program of this scope and diversity. It has been built on the talent, commitment, and abiding interest of those who perform and those who attend. The Genesius Guild is one of the Quad Cities' most unusual assets; one which enriches and educates citizens of all ages, of all social and economic backgrounds. Mr. Tschopp got involved in 1995 after meeting Don Wooten. Don learned that Doug had a lighting & sound business and asked him to help with lighting at the Genesius Guild outdoor stage. Doug said he attended a show, came back the next morning to clean and adjust the lights, got caught up in Classical Theater and never left. He told us that the Guild performs an eight-week season ever summer with performances each Saturday and Sunday night at 7pm. They typically do two Shakespear plays and two Greek in mask comedies or tragedies each summer. To illustrate the importance of keeping the tradition of classical theater alive, Tschopp and Rotarian Kia Swanson presented a reading from a Don Wooten authored piece that identified more than 70 direct quotes and phrases from Shakespear that have found they way into everyday language of modern Western culture. Mr. Tschopp also noted that the current outdoor Guild theater was build as a WPA project during the depression and unfortunately with ground settling, will only be used for two more years. The hope is to build or rebuild the theater which originally had a wading pool in front of the stage. The pool has not been used for many years and is likely to be removed during the renovation so the audience can be moved closer to the stage. We also learned that the Guild is lead by a Board of Directors with Mr. Tschopp serving as Executive Director. When asked about including opera in their performances, Tschopp stated that several years ago opera was a part of the season however they found it to be extremely expensive and also had numerous performance cancellations because in rain or threatening weather musicians were reluctant to bring their instruments for an outdoor performance. Ultimately it was decided to support local opera, but not have it included in the Guild season performances. He also stated that some individual seating is provided along with bleachers and said that many bring lawn chairs to the performances. Some bring picnics for pre-show dining, other take advantage of concessions that are available. Tschopp invited those interested to visit the Genesius Guild website at www.genesius.org For more information. He also said that colleges and universitates and high school teachers from all over the country use materials provided on the website in their classrooms. The website offers "Play Resources" for Greek and Shakespearian literature. Mr. Tschopp proudly stressed several times that the Rock Island Genesius Guild is the only place in the world where audiences can witness classical theater performed in costume, mask, and in authentically translated scripts of ancient Greek and 16th Century English plays. We thank Mr. Tschopp and Kai for an extremely interesting and informative presentation.
