The Project of the Quad Cities, often called “The Project” was established in 1986 to serve people living with HIV/AIDS with remarkable care and radical acceptance. A 501c3 charitable organization, the Project takes a holistic approach to health care by treating the entire individual. Services have grown tremendously to include a sexual health clinic, no-cost mental health services, LGBTQ+ health care, and more. Wellness services and financial assistance to ensure a high quality of life for people living with HIV. They also offer support services for people living with Hepatitis C including testing and treatment; no-cost mental health services for people living with HIV, the LGBTQ+ community, and survivors of crime; same-day sexually transmitted disease testing, results, and treatment; PrEP and PEP to prevent HIV transmission; primary health care for LGBTO+ individuals and families; and convenient access to discounted prescription via Two Rivers Pharmacy with no membership required. Tyler Mitchell, Development Director for The Project was our guest speaker today. He stated that The Project was established on 1986 during the height of the HIV-AIDS epidemic. At the time the disease was a death sentence for most who contracted the infection. The Project, then known as the AIDS Project and the AIDS Coalition was formed to help and be with those that were suffering and dieing. Since then trememndous medical progress has been made in the prevention, detection, and treatment of sexually transmitted infections (STI) and HIV. The Project has also grown substantially and expanded its scope and services. Rather than sitting with those who are approaching death, they now are at the forefront in medical case management and STI/HIV testing. Thanks to numerous medical innovations, persons with HIV now with a regimen of medicines live long lives and can enjoy normal sexual relations without fear of transmitting the infection to their partners. The Project recently moved into the former John Deere Medical facility on John Deere Road in Moline, giving much needed space to expand their full ranges of services which include an in house pharmacy and medical lab. Someone suspecting they may have come into contact with HIV or other STI can come in, be tested, get results the same day and if needed obtain the medication recommended for their situation. Although the Project will accept insurance and/or private payment for their services, no patient is turned away because of cause. If they have no insurance and cannot afford testing or treatment, they receive everything they need free of charge. They also provide behavioral health services and prophylaxis medications both to those that have HIV which has a 98% success rate in preventing transmission to others and post exposure prophylaxis medication to those that believe they were exposed to HIV with the same success rate in preventing the disease. Mr. Mitchell said that the Project serves about 4,000 patients per year and noted that the incidence of the infection is declining. They also provide short and long term housing assistance and transportation assistance of their patients. Knowing that not all those suffering from the diseases can or will come to their facility, The Project has a mobile clinic that travels throughout the area taking services to those in need. In closing Mr. Mitchell invited all to participate in the 8am start of their June 15th “Pride 5K” run/walk followed by a 4pm Pride Party, both in Moline. They also have a golf outing scheduled on September 26th starting at 10:30am at Glynns Creek Golf Course. We thank Tvler for his detailed presentation!

ROTARY FOUNDATION MINUTE

Nine Pacific countries have committed to greater protection for children against life threatening diseases by expanding their immunization program that has been implemented by UNICEF in collaboration with Ministries of Health and funding from Rotary since 2020. The commitment will see vaccines for Pneumococcal Disease, Rotavirus, and Human Papillomavirus (HPV) added to the nations' National Programs for Immunization. Rotary Project Director, James Allen, has been leading Rotary fundraising in Australia and New Zealand, and said, "Pacific countries are our near neighbors and we're proud of the contribution we have made to protect children and adolescents in the region against life-threatening illnesses including pneumonia, diarrhea, and cervical cancer." In the Pacific, pneumonia and diarrhea are among the top three causes of mortality in children under five years of age, while around one-third of all pneumonia deaths are due to pneumococcal disease. Rotavirus is the leading cause of severe diarrhea in children aged less than five years. Severe diarrhea can lead to dehydration, particularly in young children, and if left untreated can be life-threatening. Since the Rotary 'Give Every Child a Future' project's inception, it has supported the countries to strengthen the supply chain, including the cold chain system to ensure that every child has timely access to safe and potent vaccines. Rotary Project Director, James Allen, has been leading Rotary fundraising in Australia and New Zealand, and said, "... we're proud of the contribution we have made to protect children and adolescents in the region against life-threatening illnesses including pneumonia, diarrhea, and cervical cancer."

To date, fundraisers from Rotary have contributed 3.9 million dollars, through the project implemented by UNICEF, in cooperation with the nations' Ministries of Health and supported by the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

With a high burden of cervical cancer cases in the Pacific, most of which are attributed to HPV infection, the introduction of HPV Vaccine for adolescent girls will contribute to the reduction of preventable deaths. UNICEF will continue to support routine immunization programs in the Pacific island countries, through strengthening effective vaccine management practices, engaging communities to create vaccine demand and the procurement and delivery of quality as well as effective vaccines at an affordable cost to the governments. UNICEF and Rotary remain committed to ensuring that all children and adolescents have good health, well-being and reach their full potential.

Your continued support is essential to help ensure health programs for youth continue until the need is gone.

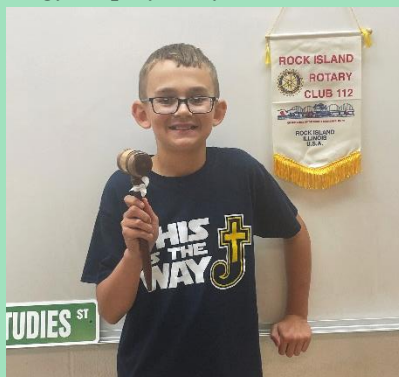
Rotary Night at the Ball Park
