of Roger Miller's Do-Wacka-Do. He played and sang just enough to get us interested and then transitioned into singing a great rendition of Miller's King of the Road in its entirety. Moving to another of those that influenced John's early performing years, he sang John Denver's Country Roads. John's performance was again outstanding with many in the room singing along. Jumping forward in his musical career, John talked of moving to Rockford, Illinois and being a regular at a local coffee house where among many talented performers he heard John Prine. He mentioned that Prine was well know for his serious compositions and many that weren't so serious. He then performed one of the "not serious" Prine tunes, "Spanish Pipedream (Blow Up Your TV)". The humorous lyrics fit John's style perfectly and allowed him to show off his guitar skills. The fun continued climbing when John turned to his own original songs. The first was He Used to Be Somebody. It was a very creative mix of thought provoking, serious lyrics with a message and humor. Again, the singing and guitar work were impressive and clearly showed that even in his original work, John incorporates challenging guitar accompaniment along with lyrics of how life changes as one ages. His second original composition was Remember Not to Forget which drew on life experiences and humorously told the story of how we often get sidetracked and forget things from as simple as why did I come in here, to more important things like Anniversaries. It touched all who have experienced such lapses, in a humorous and entertaining way. John's performance concluded with a special treat. He invited his lovely daughter Katie Phillips to join him, and the duo performed John Prine's Dear Abby a funny musical parody of the popular advice columnist. John sang the "letter" seeing Abby's advice, and Katie provided the musical answer standing in for Abby. It was fun, clever, and extremely well done. It was evident that Katie inherited her dad's flare for entertaining and outstanding vocal talent. We look forward to John's periodic performance at Rotary and feel blessed to have him in our club and willing to share his talent with us. John also makes occasional appearances performing at the Bucktown Americana Music Show (formerly The Bucktown Review) in downtown Davenport on Friday nights starting their new season in August. We're fortunate to get a preview of what others may hear in the future! Thanks John for an outstanding concert and for having Katie join you making the day truly special!

As part of TRF's mission of providing quality education in its effort at advancing world understanding, three undergraduates from Yale University were the recipients of the 2024 Rotary Global Grant Scholarship for graduate studies at prestigious British universities. Foundation Minute this week celebrates the lucky young scholars: Anjali Mangla, Joshua Nguyen and Vijay Pathak.

Anjali Mangla, a double major in Neuroscience and Global Affairs, received a Rotary Global Grant Scholarship that will allow her to pursue a master's degree in Global Health Policy at London School of Tropical Hygiene and Medicine and London School of Economics. Mangla is interested in global health policymaking, particularly in investigating sustainable financing mechanisms for global health care policy and community-based initiatives. She hopes to pioneer sustainable global health financing policies with a focus on mitigating noncommunicable diseases in the future.

Joshua Nguyen, who graduated from Yale in 2023 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Molecular, Cellular and Developmental Biology, was awarded the Rotary Global Grant Scholarship to pursue an M.Sc. degree in Digital Health at the University of Oxford. His interest in health care equity will guide his studies at Oxford, where he plans to delve into leveraging digital health innovations to serve marginalized populations. He aspires to a career dedicated to improving health equity, with a focus on supporting uninsured and low-income communities.

Vijay Pathak, a senior from Luxembourg and France who will graduate with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Ethics, Politics, and Economics, has been awarded the Rotary Global Grant to pursue studies in European Politics and international conflict prevention in the United Kingdom. His academic interests lie at the intersections of statecraft, international law, and the foreign and security policies of the EU and United States.


