Immediate Past President, Cindi Gramenz provided a very brief wrap up of the past two Rotary years. president. She first thanked the Club and stated that often members don't realize what a significant role they play for the club and its leadership just by attending meetings and being a part of the club fellowship. ROCK ISLAND ROTARY SUPPORTS BETHANY FOR CHILDREN

At our July 2nd meeting Community Grants Chair Frank Lambert had the pleasure of presenting a\$1,000 Rotary donation to Christina McNamara Director of Development and Communication for Bethany for Children and Families. Ms. McNamara stated that our funds will be used for therapeutic recreation for youth through field trips. We are delighted to be able to assist Bethany. Based in Moline, Bethany for Children & Families is a child welfare, mental health, community education, and social services provider which has offered aid and support to children and families in western Illinois and eastern Iowa since 1899. The organization staffs a professional team of nearly 135 social workers, licensed counselors, case managers, and educators, directed by a Board of volunteer community leaders. Offering 37 programs and services, Bethany serves over 15,000 children and families annually. Bethany's programs and services are accredited by the Council on Accreditation, a nonprofit accreditor of human services.



EMIL RETURNS!

In August 2019 Emil Rosen arrived from Finland to spend the year with us as our Rotary Exchange son. He attended Alleman High School and quickly became a Favorite both at school where he earned a spot on the Alleman Homecoming Court and was crowned as the Homecoming Prince, and with our Club! Unfortunately, his year was cut short when the Covid Pandemic hit. Amid concerns that travel to and from Finland would be shutdown, Emil returned home April 7, 2920. He was a favorite with our Club, and we were thrilled to have him back with us today. Since leaving Emil finished high school and served his term plus and extra year of re-enlisting in the Finish military parachute regiment.

He is now attending college in Helsinki with a major in finance and economics and hopes to continue to law school.

ROTARY FOUNDATION MINUTE

The island countries of the South Pacific are tropically warm, economically diverse, and really, really far apart. In this region, which spans millions of square miles, even individual countries' islands are scattered across vast distances. Public health workers face unique challenges in vaccinating the islands' children. The news this week is from a report by Etelka Lehoczky where Rotary's Give Every Child a Future program vaccinated over 100,000 children in several South Pacific islands. "It's hard to transport vaccines to the outer islands because of the distance and transport availability. Sometimes they have to wait one to three months to get a boat across," says Rufina Tutai, who oversees immunizations for the Cook Islands. The 15 islands in her jurisdiction are spread over nearly 2 million square kilometers (770,000 square miles). "Flights are expensive to charter, and we're lucky if a flight can go to the outer islands in less than two weeks," she adds.

Such obstacles did not deter the Rotarians of Australia, New Zealand, and several Pacific Island countries from organizing a major vaccination program in the islands. Called Give Every Child a Future, the effort – which celebrates 100 years of Rotary in the region – is providing three new vaccines to 100,000 children in nine Pacific Island groups: the Cook Islands, Kiribati, Nauru, Niue, Samoa, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu, and Vanuatu. Ultimately, the members applied for 23 Rotary Foundation Global Grants, securing more than US\$980,000 in funds from The Rotary Foundation. The program was also funded by about US\$807,000 in District Designated Funds, US\$990,000 from clubs and individual members, US\$264,000 from other foundations, and US\$860,000 from the Australian government. That funding paid for much more than vaccines. It was used to purchase special refrigerators, insulated containers, and other equipment to keep vaccines cool and transport them to the most distant islands. The health ministries in the nine island groups will be able to use this equipment for many years. That fulfills the project's other goal of helping the targeted areas add the three vaccines to their regular immunization schedules.
