the Administrative Supervisor and Client Coordinator of the Epilepsy Advocacy Network. She stated that 1 in 26 people will develop epilepsy in their lifetime. One in ten people will have a seizure. The "EAN" mission is to optimize the lives of individuals with epilepsy and seizure disorders by promoting community education and awareness, selfadvocacy and empowerment, and access to proper care. Kim joined the Epilepsy Advocacy Network in 2021 as a Client Coordinator. Her work is driven by a deep personal connection to epilepsy and a strong commitment to ensuring that others receive the support she once needed for herself and her son, who both are epileptic. With a Bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education, she brings a unique passion for outreach and education. She especially enjoys visiting schools to deliver the Epilepsy 101 program, helping students better understand epilepsy and how they can support peers who may be affected. Her role at EAN allows her to blend advocacy, education, and compassion in meaningful ways every day. The Network provides services in seizure first aid training and community education. They train school staff and other community organizations how to recognize and respond to seizures. They also have in-person and Zoom support groups for people impacted by epilepsy. They provide Individual/family consultation and service coordination to help connected sufferers to needed services, such as clinic appointments, financial assistance, transportation assistance, and more. All of their services are provided free of charge. Their coordinators are certified to provide epilepsy management programs, which can help those with epilepsy and seizure disorders better manage their condition. They host awareness events and advocate for those sufferring from the condition. One of the best programs they offer is a summer camp for youth with epilepsy and other seizure disorders. Kim said the Camp was started by our fellow member, Monta Ponsetto, when she served as Director of Epilepsy Foundation Services. "camPossible!" is a place for children with epilepsy to attend summer camp without fear of exclusion. With trained personel on site, the camp allows the youth to experience not only zip-line and kayak, but a chance to connect with others who truly understand what it's like to live with seizures. Kim reported that camp is often the catalyst for shy, embarrassed kids who often feel shame for their health condition, to have a life changing experience gaining confidence that they can achieve and succeed in whatever they might hope to do. Ms. Gregg noted that there are 20 different types of seizures and a patient may suffer from one or multiple types. In provoviding education for us she stated witnessing someone suffering a sezure, stay calm, lay something soft under the person's head, roll them onto their side so any fluids in their mouth can flow out and not into their throat. The person may make a sound, such as a groan or yell. The muscles suddenly get stiff and cause the person to fall down. Loss of consciousness occurs. This phase tends to last about 10 to 20 seconds. Then muscles relax, sometimes including the bowel or bladder allowing discharge. Time the seizure which is important for later diagnosis. Remain with the person, stay calm. Kim said the EAN served 288 clients last year, gave 3,000 hours of volunteer work, hosted 42 events, and met with or helped form 96 support groupls. That represented a tripling growth of the number of people served commpared to three years ago. We thank Kim for the information and hope we won't be called to have need to use it!



FOUNDATION MINUTE

Nadowli, Ghana – The Rotary Club of Wa commissioned six water facilities for six communities in three districts of the Upper West Region to help improve access to potable water. Over 7,000 people, especially women and girls in those communities have been relieved from the drudgery in accessing potable water, especially in the dry season. The beneficiary communities, hitherto, either depended on dugouts and wells for water or trekked long distances to access water for domestic use. Women and girls were the most affected in the water access challenge in those communities as they were responsible for providing water for their families. However, the intervention by the Rotary Club of Wa, with funding from a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation, has alleviated the water access challenge in those communities, restoring dignity in water access and use.

The expression of joy and thanksgiving among the people of the beneficiary communities during the commissioning was an indication of the long-awaited relief they anticipated: Madam Clementia Saamaala, a resident, showing her appreciation at the Nadowli-Ganga community during the commissioning, said it had saved them from resorting to dugout for water, which exposed them to waterborne diseases. At the Bussie-Nayirkori community, Madam Christian Boyor said women used to go through a lot of challenges in accessing water for their families, including waking up at dawn to queue at a well at the community for water. "We used to wake up at dawn, by 4 A.M., to queue at the well for water ... It used to generate quarrels among the women here. But with this borehole that Rotary Club has given us, you can wake up at any time and come, and you will get water to fetch. It has also helped end the petty quarrels among the women", she explained.
