INSECTS IN ART and FASHION Dr. Tierney Brosius

Affectionately known as ""Dr. Beetle", Tierney Brosius earned her B.S. at Wayne State College, and

Masters and Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska. She is an entomologist with special interests in insect conservation, urban ecology, and cultural entomology. Dr. Brosius has an active ongoing research program that currently focuses on ground beetle diversity within urban landscapes. Her goal is to understand how mesophication (lack of naturally occurring fire) and urbanization interact to influence forest ecosystem composition and structure at multiple trophic levels. Undergraduate students from Augustana have been directly involved in the data collection of many her projects and have had the opportunity to present research results at local and national scientific meetings. She is currently working on multiple student co-authored peer reviewed manuscripts. In her classrooms you will find a student-centered approach. Her students are given the opportunity to become actively engaged with the material. She is passionate about students understanding the importance and application of what they are learning in the classroom. Even while her class is learning about something as specific as the life history of a squid or a jellyfish, they are constantly relating that information back to the larger picture of ecology and evolution. Professor Brosius is on a mission to help people see the beauty in bugs through fashion. She said her fascination with "bugs' dates back to when she was four years old. Her mother brought home a dead Atlas Moth, a goliath of the

insect world, the atlas moth is a gentle giant – but behind every oversized moth is a very hungry caterpillar. The atlas moth is among the biggest insects on the planet, and the largest of all moths with a wingspan stretching up to 27 centimetres across - that's wider than a human handspan. Tierney was hooked! "I've been collecting insect fashion items since I was in graduate school. Everytime I would see a shirt with an insect on it, I would buy it," she said. "I was building up a nice little collection, and one time I was like, I wonder how many days I can go consecutively wearing a unique piece of clothing." Starting in 2019 Dr. Brosius started a spring Ento-Fashion Challenge, to see how many



consecutive days she could wear a different insect apparrel. She documents each outfit on her Instagram account with the username Dr. Beetle. At last count she was over 40 days and says she now could go longer! People follow her for fashion, but she incorporates some educational parts to it, talking about insects, why they're amazing, and also kind of sharing her love and passion. Dr. Brosius also told of the Tiger Beetle that lives in the Pacific northwest and has no problem walking through the boiling hot geothermal springs in Yellowstone Park dining on other bugs in the water filled with high concentrations of chemical toxins such as arsenic and other nasty chemical constituents. She said the studies are essentially trying to learn, "Why aren't you dead?" She turned her attention to bugs in fashion. Noting that high fashion brands have frequently turned to bugs in design and adornment in fashion. Designers and artists including Gucci, Scaparelli, Alexander McQueen, and Disney's fictional character Corella de Vil all sported bugs in their clothing and art. Dr. Brocius' presentation included an ample supply of photos to illustrate how often bugs, bug designs, and even "real" bugs are used in fashion and art. This was a truly fascinating presentation!

FOUNDATION MINUTE

In recognition of October as The Rotary Foundation's Polio Month, this, and subsequent reports will be on the relentless efforts of Rotary to totally eradicate the crippling disease from the face of the earth. From Italy comes the news that, "There may be no better way to spotlight (literally!) polio awareness than through the can't-miss illuminations of global landmarks. Those monuments have included the Sydney Opera House, London's Houses of Parliament, Rome's Colosseum, the Egyptian pyramids, Scottish castles, and more. For World Polio Day 2024, the Rotary and Rotaract clubs in the Pisa area teamed up with community leaders to turn the floodlights on the Leaning Tower of Pisa. "This is a commitment that we wanted to share together precisely to reach a wider audience," the club presidents noted in a statement. They have displayed historic buildings for about 25 years and the city's signature tower over the past five. The clubs also had a video about polio eradication shown on monitors at the Pisa Airport."

Rotarians under the leadership of project chair Sue Rector hosted about 80 1st and 2nd grade students from Earl Hanson Elementary School at the Corn Crib's Pumpkin Patch on Route 150 south of the Quad City International Airport. IH Mississippi Valley Credit Union covered the admission fees for all the kids, teachers, and Rotary helpers. Every child received a Rotary Pumpkin Palooza shirt, a new book, stuffed toy, ditty bag, stickers, balloons, treats, and of course, a pumpkin! Angela Cambell, Rock Island's Library Director had the Bookmobile on site and a scavenger hunt designed by Sue ensured that every child visited the mobile library. Geno DelPreore set up a tent, tables, and brought the Nika Loves Charity huge blowup unicorn, along with the books and stuffed toys purchased by Rotary to give to the kids. Gene added stickers and ballons for each child. World Polio Day materials were also distributed as takehome items. The kids had multiple fun activities riding the cow train, zip line, tug of war, bounce pad, pedal cars, sand box, hayrack ride, and more! Wezz DeLaRosa was on hand with camera to record the fun. One of Rotary's 7 Areas of Focus

Providing clean, safe, water is an ongoing major emphasis of Rotary International and for our Rock Island Rotary Club.

Rock Island Rotary started our own international service project eight years ago raising funds to purchase and provide water filtration units to schools in impoverished, remote villages in Kenya. This is an ongoing project and to date we have provided 279 Community water filters supplying safe drinking water to over 22,000 children. The villages were identified by the Kenyan government as previously having <u>no access</u> to safe drinking water. Yesterday we received confirmation from Replenish, Inc., that our most recently purchased 10 filters have been delivered, installed, and local school personnel have been trained in the use and maintenance of the filters. General sanitation training was also provided to the children and their parents. Unfortunately, the letter also included a list of 64 more locations identified to be without any source of clean water. Our project is ongoing. Donations in any amount can be made to Rock Island Rotary with the notation "Water Project" it will be deposited with other donations as we collect funds to purchase 10 more filters. The cost per filter is #350. There is much yet to do. Worldwide almost two billion people have no access to safe drinking water. An estimated 88 percent of childhood illnesses are related to contaminated water and poor sanitation. At least 3,000 children die each day from diseases caused by unsafe water! HOMA BAY LIFESTRAW PROGRAM Report on Installation of 10 Additional Replenish Filters and Training - October 2025

The Homabay LifeStraw staff successfully conducted the installation of 10 additional LifeStraw Community Filters and retraining sessions in four Replenish-supported schools. These schools had previously received only one filter each since 2017. However, due to significant increases in student enrollment, the need for additional filters became evident to ensure consistent access to safe and adequate drinking water. The beneficiaries expressed deep appreciation to Replenish for their timely intervention and unwavering support, which continues to transform the learning environment and promote the health and well-being of pupils and staff alike.

Ten LifeStraw Community Filters provided by the Rotary Club of Rock Island, Illinois, USA, were successfully installed in the four schools. Identification decals were placed on each filter. Retraining sessions were conducted for teachers and learners on filter use, maintenance, and safe water handling. Health and behavior change education sessions were delivered to enhance hygiene practices and promote sustained use of the filters. Repairs were conducted on previously installed filters to ensure full functionality. The activities were lively and engaging, with learners enthusiastically participating and enjoying safe water during the training sessions. The additional filters have significantly enhanced the learning environment, ensuring that both learners and teachers can enjoy safe, clean water throughout the school day. Staff noted that this support not only addresses water safety but also contributes to better health, concentration, and attendance among pupils.
