DIVING OUR RIVERS!

Often programs presented by our own members are some of the best we have. Today was no exception with Mark Poulos a Rock Island Rotarian since 2021 telling us about his passion as a scuba diver, specializing in local river diving and heading the local Rescue and Recovery

Team, known as the Big River Dive Team. Prior to forming the all volunteer team, Mark had a distinguished career in the military, serving in several operations on US Navy missions, then in law enforcement serving in the Rock Island Police Department and later as Coal Valley Chief of Police. When the Dive Team was first formed they primarily were asked to help clear out clogged farm culverts. Gradually they began to get calls from area police and fire departments asking for help in rescue and recovery and in solving crimes. They have done dives to recover weapons, vehicles, people, and property. Mark said when they first started they called themselves the "FROGS" which stood for "Four Really Old Guys". That didn't go over too well and was changed to the "Big River Dive Team" providing rescue and recovery operations in the Quad Cities Region. Mark noted that unfortunately they are much more often doing recovery rather than rescue because people don't call immediately when emergencies occur. By the time they are called, get the team assembled and on site, it is often too late for rescue. He said there is still much satisfaction in providing closure for family members of those who die in the water. Fortunately, they have rescued a number of victims of vehicles going into the river. The team works with law enforcement agencies and only goes into a case if requested. Because of the dangerous conditions in our rivers, the Team reserves the right to refuse to dive if conditions are too dangerous. He said that has only happened one time, since the team was formed in 2011. Their services are provided without charge. Members of the team are volunteers and must be certified open water divers to seek to join the team. Mark is a scuba diving instructor and trains volunteers in the methods of operation and the dangers of working rescue and recovery. A recovery team includes a minimum of 3 trained divers. One goes in the water, one monitors the dive and is ready to enter the water immediately if trouble occurs. The third, often a newer team member handles equipment, monitors the dive and is a third option backup diver if an emergency occurs. What was interesting was the number of vehicles that go in the river, quite often occupied by a driver and passengers. He said there are currently 8 vehicles sitting on the bottom of the Mississippi, that the City of Davenport has decided to leave where they are. Bringing in the equipment to remove them even after their location is found is an expensive proposition. So a cost vs. benefits analysis is done. If recover of the vehicle is not needed for a crime investigation, it may be left where it lies. Mark said in the past two weeks they have recovered three vehicles and a 400 pound stolen concrete saw from the Mississippi. The Team's services have been requested from all over northern and central Illinois and western lowa but said they only go if asked by a first responder organization. He said there are similar dive teams in other areas and they don't tread on each other's territory unless invited by police or fire officials in that area. He also said they have received suppoort from area police and fire departments and from communities. Scott County gave a truck which the Team sold and used the money to buy equipment. He noted that each diver provides their own equipment and said a dry suit costs \$2,000 to \$2,500, the regulator runs \$3,000, and the mask with built in communication costs \$2,000. So, the volunteers have a significant investment before they ever make a dive. Once a certified diver joins the team and has their own equipment, they undergo intensive and detailed training. Some are swimming and diving training and testing with an annual requirement of being capable of swimming 800 meters (a bit more than 32 laps in a typical high school competition pool!). They also train in Mark's river pool where he can generate up to an 8 mile per hour current. He noted that a 6 mile per hour current is the maximum speed considered safe for open water diving. He uses the pool to train team members how to swim in high currents and to show them what may happen in such currents so when it does occur in the river, the diver has previously experienced it and knows what to do. An example he gave was having a diver swim into a 6 mile per hour current and then make a turn to retreat. He noted that as he makes the turn the swift current will pull the mask off his face. After training, the diver knows to hold the mask tightly against his face until the turn is completed and his body is moving with the current. He stressed that training is the key for safe diving, particularly in "black water" such as the Mississippi. During normal summer conditions, a diver can't see the end of his own arm under water in the Mississippi. Much of their search and recover work is done by "feel" and even with magnets, which he said was how he located the concrete saw. They also are trained in underwater communication, both using the electronic equipment and hand signaling in the event of electronic failure. Mark said the goal of the Big River Dive Team is to provide quality, well-trained service, free of charge to area first responders. It is a wonderful service and our community is fortunate to have. It seems amazing that they are not regularly paid by some sort of joint community collective agreement. We thank Mark for his interesting and informative presentation.

FOUNDATION MINUTE

The report this week is directly from the message of TRF's Trustee Chair, Rotarian Holger Knaack, culled from Rotary Magazine (September 2025).

Education is the most powerful tool we have for changing the world, and during Basic Education and Literacy Month, I want to remind everyone why our work matters. Education breaks the cycle of poverty, opens doors to opportunity, and empowers individuals to transform their communities. But education doesn't exist in a vacuum. We must also address peace, health, clean water, economic opportunity, maternal and child health, and the environment. ... When we collaborate across these areas through The Rotary Foundation, we raise up communities sustainably and with dignity. Today, I have asked Lynne Paradis from the Rotary Club of Red Deer, Alberta, to share her passion for literacy: "I believe that literacy is a human right. When I joined forces with the Rotary Club of San Ignacio, Belize, over a decade ago, we set out to improve reading instruction, but we had no idea how far this journey would take us. Literacy Alive! has been supported by eight Rotary Foundation global grants since 2011. Using a straightforward approach based on phonics and science, we updated how teachers teach and focused on how students really learn. We collected data on reading skills improvement over six months. After demonstrating that teachers had integrated new practices into daily instruction, the project snowballed. The Belize Ministry of Education took notice. Today, over 1,300 teachers have been trained, and more than 20,000 students have benefited. We've achieved over 90 percent success rates, with many students making more than a year's worth of improvement in just five months." Lynne's story exemplifies the power of Foundation grants. Through partnerships spanning six Rotary clubs and three countries, Literacy Alive! reminds us how good Rotary is at creating systemic change. When our members' passion meets Foundation support, we don't just improve individual lives, we change entire communities.
